The Kamehameha Schools students and staff have been involved in a variety of ways with the Polynesian Voyaging Society. Some of our work has included utilizing student help in the construction of the canoe, Wright Bowman for consultation and construction, the purchase of t-shirts, etc. Our continued association, even in an indirect manner, will have reciprocal benefits for the Society and our Schools, especially in regards to Polynesian navigation, and all other cultural aspects involved in the construction and sailing of a Polynesian vessel.

The 60-foot vessel which will be making the voyage is scheduled for launching on March 8, 1975. The Society has requested the use of six hefty boys who are willing to participate in the launching ceremonies as paddlers and chanters. There are specific ceremonial chants involved in the launching of a canoe and I believe Ka'upena Wong and others are aware of these chants. Herb Kane has specifically asked that six of our students be involved in the ceremonies working through the direction of Ka'upena Wong, or other appropriate personnel, and assisting in the actual paddling. Is it possible for us to participate in the launching ceremonies and answer the request from Herb Kane?

What Can Be Observed:

Facilities: The Polynesian voyaging canoe, Hokule'a, which successfully completed a trip from Hawai'i to Tahiti and back this past summer. At times work of maintaining the canoe will be in progress. A visit, if utilized properly, can be a worthwhile experience which can be applied to many areas of instruction.

Activities: Will vary to accommodate age level and group size. Observing-noting different parts of the canoe and how they function; discussion of Polynesian ocean voyaging, navigation techniques, types of food, plants, animals associated with ancient voyaging; looking at charts, maps; handling paddles, steering sweeps; observing other Polynesian artifacts related to voyaging (cordage, sennit, sails, etc.).

Subject : Moloka'i Trip with Hōkūle'a.

I have formalized plans for the trip to Moloka'i and final confirmation will be recieved from Moloka'i tomorrow morning at 9:00 a.m. by telephone.

As things now stand, Hōkūle'a will depart Pier 18 early Sunday morning on the 10th of October. This will be a day sail and if the trades start blowing again, we should reach Moloka'i late that afternoon. Hopefully, we will be able to sail and not rely upon the 40 hp. outboard engine whose condition is in doubt at this time. Billy Richards has been in communication with Penny Rawlins on Moloka'i and Penny, along with a committee of Moloka'i people who formed the "Penny Rawlins Day" celebration, anxiously await the arrival of Hōkūle'a and crew.

I am in communication with Richard Negrillo of Moloka'i who is coordinating, along with Penny, our welcome to Moloka'i and our week's stay there. They will aid in our lodging and meals and will also handle our mooring area at Kaunakakai and what towboats we may need. Mr. Negrillo said that there would be a number of boats who would be meeting and greeting us and that if necessary, they can tow us from Lā'au Pt.

It is "Aloha Week" on Moloka'i and the presence of Hōkūle'a will certainly make this a most memorable one for Moloka'i. Nothing is planned for Sunday night but it looks like the people of Moloka'i will have events scheduled during the remainder of the week. Monday is "Discoverer's Day" and a holiday. This will give people from the outlying areas a chance to come and visit Hōkūle'a. On Tuesday and possibly Thursday evenings, Mr. Negrillo would like a slide presentation given to the community. This would be followed by a question-and-answer period and a general rap-session. I will confirm this tomorrow.

I have been in touch with Cliff Horita who is the administrative liason person for the DOE on Moloka'i. He says that financially there is a problem with the funding of buses for schools in the outlying areas who desire to take field trips. He also stated that the DOE has no liability coverage which will cover field trips to the Hōkūle'a. His suggestion was that children visit the canoe accompanied by their parents so that there will be parental guidance. Visitations can be made with Moloka'i High (Ron Kula) and Kaunakakai Elementary (Ed Kashiwamura). Mr. Negrillo is also aiding in the education setup for presentations or visitations.

The Hōkūle'a will return to Honolulu on the 17th of October and berth at Pier 18 upon return. Canoe and crew will accompany the racing canoes making the Moloka'i-O'ahu race.

It is my belief that responsibilities should be shared when possible so that PVS members who sail on Hōkūle'a will become more knowledgeable and assume more responsibility. In a sense this is a form of education amongst ourselves. Thus, it is recommended that Wally Froiseth be acting Captain on the trip to Moloka'i and that Kimo Lyman be acting Captain on the return trip. Watch sections can be setup and individuals can be tasked in the role of watch-captains. Piloting can be practiced by other individuals in the role of navigators. Other possibilities do exist.

Subject : Moloka'i to Honolulu Trip (17 October 1976)

The Hokule'a castoff from the wharf area at 0530 on the morning of the 17th. There were 22 people aboard the Hokule'a. Wally Froseith towed Hokule'a outside of the pier area where she anchored until the start of the Moloka'i-O'ahu Canoe Race. The race started 0615, anchor was raised and Hokule'a was towed to La'au Pt. by the Manuiwa. Towline was castoff and Hokule'a sailed with 8 to 10 knots wind from a NE'ly direction. The winds increased from 10 to 15 knots in the channel and Hokule'a averaged 4 to 5 kts speed. Passed most the canoe fleet but could not catch up with the leaders.

Hokule'a arrived Waikiki area (finish area) where it was very congested with small boats. Elected to wait outside the Ala Wai for a tow. Wally Froseith towed Hokule'a to Pier 18. No damage sustained to Hokule'a during trip.

Points to make : 1) No waivers were signed; 2) there were too many people aboard for the number of life jackets carried (22 people - 19 life jackets); 3) the bottom is fouled and makes the canoe very sluggish. It is suggested that Hokule'a carry a 30'-anchor chain of 1"-chain and another anchor like that lost at Kalaupapa. Use the anchor now aboard as a spare anchor.

A. Proposal (Koko Marina)

This is a proposal to utilize Hōkūle'a when possible (weather permitting, crew available, etc.), as a floating classroom during the weekends the canoe will be moored at Koko Marina, Hawaii Kai.

A. Captain: Nainoa Thompson would be willing to act as Captain and would be familiar with the duties and responsibilities of an acting Captain as set forth by the Polynesian Voyaging Society.

B. Crew: Crew members and/or participants would be selected by the acting Captain, as was done on the canoe's trip to Pokai Bay and back to Hawaii Kai. All crew members and/or participants would be required to sign waivers and should be members of the P.V.S.

C. Day Sails: Hōkūle'a will be taken out for day sails on weekends to be determined by the acting Captain. Overnite sails can also be made as a means of furthering educational use of Hōkūle'a (non-instrumental navigation, human adjustment to nite sailing, etc.). Further research into canoe and human performance may possibly be accomplished. Also, the P.V.S. can finalize obligations with those 20 individuals who won (contest: guess date/time of Tahiti arrival) and are still owed a sail aboard the Hōkūle'a.

D. Educational Input: Various aspects relative to overall operation of a canoe (racing/sailing) would be covered during the weekend usage of Hōkūle'a. Areas covered can include native materials used in construction of a canoe, non-native materials substituting for native materials), lashings, rigging sails (adjustment and tacking or jibbing), making of different types of paddles, steering methods, and raking of masts and sails for different wind conditions. Other areas could include seamanship, rules of the road presently governing Hōkūle'a, safety at sea, use of safety equipment, navigation methods for day sailing (instrumental/non-instrumental), weather knowledge, local geographic features and factors, and maintenance of a canoe. There will be some practical maintenance of Hōkūle'a accomplished by weekend participants. There are so many possibilities available to the P.V.S. which would be better than not using the Hōkūle'a on weekends.

I am submitting this proposal to the Education Committee on behalf of Nainoa Thompson who is presently out-of-state. I highly endorse his interest and willingness to help the P.V.S. achieve part of its educational goals.

B. Proposal (Kealaikahiki)

To sail Hōkūle'a during the early part of April 1977.

1. Investigate further the Kane-Kanaloa tradition in regards to Kealaikahiki as being a suitable and appropriate departure point for sailing to Kahiki. By sailing down Kealaikahiki Channel and/or using Pu'u-O-Hoku and Kealaikahiki Point as a range and sailing below the wind shadow or outside of the lee of the Big Island, it is hoped that the following can be accomplished:

- a) that this proposed short trip is a more logical departure route and closer to traditional information we have in regards to long canoe voyages than: the route taken north of Maui and Hawaii by Hōkūle'a this past summer.
- b) that a sailing vessel and its crew would have a more comfortable sail and would more readily adjust to a long canoe voyage. As it turned out, Hōkūle'a sailed close to the wind and immediately made the initial part of the trip to Tahiti a longer and wet one. Crews, especially non-ocean going members, will better adjust to the sea canoe initially and the start would be a drier one.
- c) that, by picking up a point on the track of Hōkūle'a on her trip to Tahiti, that it was a longer trip and as many as 6 days possibly could have been saved if this proposal is used. Gradual easting would have been more comfortable and overall easting still would have been accomplished.
- d) that traditionally Kealaikahiki Point and Channel were appropriately named and the possibility of departure (as proposed) was an intelligent selection by the early Hawaiian navigator and not prefabricated. Knowledgeable Hawaiians were consulted with prior to Hōkūle'a departure from Maui but advice given not heeded. This proposal will heed knowledgeable Hawaiians and their advice.
- e) Research input is tremendous (navigation, canoe performance, lauhala sails, etc.).

Other information regarding crew, food, etc. will follow soon.

As requested by the society, I am submitting this proposal asking that the Polynesian Voyaging Society design, install, and dismantle an exhibition to be shown to our public school children beginning in March and ending in June.

Artmobile Hawai'i-Ho'onani belonging to the Department of Education will be the mobile unit that will take the exhibition to schools on Oahu. This is a self-contained unit that has various exhibitions displayed and sent to schools to help enrich and orient our children in the artistic endeavor of the Hawaiians and our artists of Hawaii.

The following aspects of the proposed project is listed here:

- A. Design and install an exhibition on Polynesian Voyaging.
Suggested articles, objects and items:
 1. Model(s) of canoe(s)
 2. Enlarged photos or paintings - (24" x 36" the smallest)
 3. Some of the articles taken on a journey
 4. Model or an actual hale built in the artmobile
 5. Material or plants that were used for various parts of the canoe, such as "aha," "lauhala" for sails (or part of a sail), plants prepared for long journeys (this can be a bundle of dry material but wrapping done in authentic manner to show students).
- B. Develop a brochure for class room use. This should be done in cooperation with the Artmobile Specialist. This material is used as orientation before the mobile arrives at a school, as review material for students and teachers and as a resource for follow-up in the schools. This material should be done by January.
- C. Develop a slide-tape presentation to be used as a motivating activity, enrichment, clarification, preparation or follow-up. This would be the property of the Department of Education, Artmobile Program.
