MEMO : CONVERSATION WITH SCOTT STONE
10:15 am, 23 Feb 77
Via telephone

Talked with LCDR Stone who is on special active duty for 6 months in the PAO office of COMTHIRDFLT. He lately has been spokesman for 3rdFLT in regards to the Kahoolawe situation. He is interested in finding out what the Navy can do for the Polynesian Voyaging Society and how they can help the Polynesian Voyaging Society. I gave him no answers.

My conversation with Scott Stone primarily was to find out how we can accomplish our Kealaikahiki trip in April. The reason behind this is we will be taking departure off Kealaikahiki Pt. and will most likely be sailing in restricted waters. Scott indicated that perhaps (and he was most positive in this aspect) that the canoe may be allowed to land on the Island prior to departure and a beach ceremony could be held. He even went as far as to say that an escort boat possibly could be provided. He is familiar with Hawaiian tradition of departing from Kahoolawe and feels that to pursue this endeavor in April, as far as the Navy is concerned, they would encourage this type of project.

I'll be leaving a proposal for Scott this weekend at the OPCON Center so he can get an idea as to what the Polynesian Voyaging Society is doing.

Dear Cecilia:

It was so nice to get your Christmas greeting and note. I'm really glad you took over the chairmanship of the education committee. I know it's a tremendously big job, but you are so organized and efficient, and willing to follow through and get things done, that I'm sure it's working out well.

I asked Eleanor to give you the PVS file on catalogue numbers and copyrights. I hope she did.

I don't think the workbook would qualify for the Library of Congress catalogue number. But if we do any more books, we'll want to use those forms. In the meantime, you can concentrate on the copyright.

The important thing is to have the (c symbol put in by the printer when the book is printed. (That's what I didn't do on the first Teacher's Guide and on Mo'ikeha). After the book is printed, you simply fill out the copyright forms, have them notarized, sign them, and send them with a check for \$6.00 and two copies of the book to the address that's given on the form.

You have to send original forms. They won't accept xerox copies. But before mailing, I always made a copy for us to keep in our files.

It takes about six months to hear from them once you've sent in the form and your check.

I think it would be a good idea to put the PVS address in the workbook, as we did in the revised edition of the Teacher's Guide. That way people can contact us directly if they should happen to see a copy of the book someplace and want to buy one.

I'm so glad you're going ahead with the workbook, slide-tape show, and Hawaiian glossary tapes. The whole thing will make an excellent unit, which can be taught as a mini-course in Hawaiian culture, even on the Mainland. I, too, am sorry I'm not there to help you, but glad you have a good committee and can delegate some of the responsibility.

Eleanor wrote that she is leaving soon. I hope they find a secretary to replace her. Eleanor was (is) bright, but unfortunately very disorganized. It would be nice to find someone again like Michele' or Ha'aheo.

In the meantime I hope someone is taking care of book orders, making out invoices, and keeping our records straight. Otherwise all the book money will go into the general fund, and we never will get the printing bill paid off.

Speaking of bills, Eleanor also said that we now have \$2500.00 in grant money toward another book

4 She wrote that we were turned down by McInerney, and G.N. Wilcox hasn't met yet. But at least it's a start. This time I don't want to do the book at all until we have at least \$6,000.00, which is what I figured we'll need for printing and publication costs. Of course, the longer we wait the more we'll need, because prices keep going up.

And in that cost I don't think I included anything for a brochure to let people know the book is available.

I hope our \$2500.00 stays in our Children's Book Fund checking account, and isn't "borrowed" by the general fund. I know it will be tempting to use that money for the upcoming trip to Tahiti. That's what happened to some of our grant money last time, and as you know it's never been repaid.

I'm hoping the education committee can send someone to the Teacher Institute Days and the Instructional Materials "xhibits. I think this is the best way to reach a lot of teachers. Even though we went last year, there may be teachers who haven't bought the books. There may be new teachers, or teachers who are now teaching Hawaiiana, who weren't before. Also, our being there may remind those teachers who are using our books that perhaps they should buy some more copies.

I don't know how active Pat and Jack are currently (their status seems to change from time to time) but Pat Thielen would be an excellent person to go, if she would do it. She's artistic and can arrange tasteful displays, and she's not afraid to speak up and make sales.

Did Paige tell you I've been invited to speak to the Association for Childhood Education International at their study conference in March? She asked me to submit a budget to the Board, which I did, and Eleanor said it was approved. They've invited me to speak for an hour and a half! With that much time I feel like a child who's just been given a new toy to play with. I'm usually trying to squeeze everything I want to say about the books into five or ten minutes.

This way I can talk about the voyage, go into some of the research which went into the voyage, food preparation, and the books, and really tie everything neatly together. I can't sell books, but can have order blanks available, and can let people know where they can get the books.

For this organization, do you think I should ask the \$6.00 or the \$9.95 price? I'm tempted to go with \$9.95. What do you think?

Since I'll have so much time, I'd like to show slides of the canoe and the voyage. I need your advice on the best way to borrow slides. Could the Education Committee get some together (from all those duplicates Fred used to talk about) or would it be better for me to write individually to Gordon, Dave, and Ben Young and ask to borrow from them? I'll need the slides by the first week in March, so I'll have time to prepare my talk. I will promise to take good care of them, and to mail them back as soon as the meeting is over.

I'm interested to know who the new officers and board members will be.

Eleanor also said you and Gordon got a grant from Kamehameha Schools. Is that just for education? Congratulations!

Yes, we're freezing. It's currently 12° F. with winds up to 50 miles an hour. We took the children to Vermont after Christmas for five days skiing.

when you're actually skiing, it's a much better feeling, because you're moving around and it's not just sitting there and waiting for the snow to stop.

The following letter constitutes a proposal for a cultural project to be conducted by Hokule'a.

It is now clear that the historic voyage by Hokule'a to Tahiti in 1976 was as much a cultural event as it was experimental or scientific. The people of Tahiti showed their interest in common kinship when 15,000 persons greeted the canoe as she arrived and then again massed at Taputapuetea on Raiatea where meaningful ceremonies were performed.

Frequently during the brief visit to Tahiti the Tahitians would question, "You call yourselves the children of Tahiti but from what ohana? What province, what district, what temple have you come from?"

I would like to propose that we answer these questions concerning the origin of the Hawaiian people. The traditions of the great chief Moikeha and migrating chiefs from Kahiki to Hawaiiloa have been documented in a periodical publication known as the Polynesian Journal available from the Brigham Young University. The author of this work is Rubelite Kawena Johnson, associate professor of Melo-Malaysia Language Studies at the University of Hawaii Manoa. She has spent twenty years researching the history of Hawaii's people through the Kumu Lipo, the chant of creation.

The delivery of this work by Hokule'a will promote a valuable link between these two cultures.

I have already requested that a French translation be made of this accomplished work and hope that copies of it can be presented to the Governor General of French Polynesia, to the mayor of Papeete and to other provincial heads so that all may learn of the specific link the Hawaiians have in the particular districts of Tahiti.

The significance of this connection between cultures and the presentation of the document by the Polynesian Voyaging Society will have international importance and be a makana nui. A "lei" established by the migrating ali'i to Hawaii from Tahiti in voyaging canoes in the 9th century can now be completed. The Lei of Genealogy, the Lei of the People, the Lei of Kapuna Kahiko Kaiwi.

I believe this presentation to be of "high purpose" spiritually and culturally and in keeping with the original concepts of the Polynesian Voyaging Society laid down seven years ago at the inception of the Society. The official letter from the Governor of Hawaii to the Governor General of French Polynesia should be presented upon Hokule'a's arrival in Papeete by a representative team from the crew members.

Two copies of the document will be presented to the Board of Directors of the Polynesian Voyaging Society so that it may be examined for content and merit. Perhaps we can consider having Mrs. Johnson attend the formal reception at the Thompson's home on February 23, so that she can answer any questions we have concerning this work.

Surely the significance of such a cultural exchange is worthy of your deep consideration. It marks yet another aspect in the realization of meaningful goals for the Polynesian Voyaging Society.

Aloha:

I am writing this letter in reference to our positions with ALU LIKE which as you are aware will terminate at the end of this month, Thursday, May 31st...."unless a miracle happens" within the next 6 working days that remain.

I feel Marlene's position as Executive Administrative Secretary should be seriously considered for an extension as long as possible by our 'ohana.

Yes, at this time, it is both impractical and unrealistic operating under a "bleeding budget" to maintain two positions without outside funding, nevertheless, steps and IMMEDIATE ACTION should be taken to somehow continue, even if the PVS has to shuffle monies from one account to another temporarily, to support and sustain Marlene's secretarial position. In order to keep the PVS both EFFECTIVE and VIABLE, this is a serious necessity and at this point should be treated as a TOP PRIORITY.

Although Mar's position is labeled secretarial, in reality she is really the nucleus of the PVS as she administers the operational functions that are necessary for an organization to remain ORGANIZED, INFORMED AND ENERGIZED. Let her position terminate and the progress we have struggled for and gained this past year will lose its momentum UNLESS you give it your immediate attention and devise some means of keeping her on board should ALU LIKE absolutely refuse us funding after the 31st.

Perhaps, since she is working closely with the Steering Committee, handling their paper work for the Voyage 1980, monies could be borrowed from that account as operational costs for Voyage 1980. It legit!

Perhaps, we can wait on the motion seconded at our last meeting to allot \$2,700.00 for new tee shirts. We still have 96 left....and why have new tee shirts if you don't have your secretary to coordinate the production and marketing of them.

How can we have an effective fund raising drive if you don't have an administrative planner to see that all the details are carefully followed through?

Who's going to keep the correspondence between the PVS board, committee members, and members alive? Who's going to be the hub of communication between the office and the public? Who's going to answer the phones? You? It is nothing more than a mere delusion to hope that volunteers are going to come in to do all of the needed operational functions. Lets face it, its been difficult getting members out there to work at exhibits and all they had to do was sit and man a booth....they didn't even have to push a typewriter key. We must keep in mind most of our members are active professionals with careers that absorb a great deal of their time and energies and we can't expect them to carry on a full time job operating the PVS office. Paper work and the administration of clerical functions are very time consuming.

Perhaps a special meeting between yourselves can be called after Thursday's final decision by Alu Like, to explore the different possibilities of raising immediate revenues rather than waiting till June 15th, for the next Board Meeting for discussion and than approval. Action needs to be taken now if the office is to remain open come Friday, June 1st.

If the approved motion made at the Board Meeting of April 5th...."if we keep one, we will keep two" still sits with the Board, may I add my feelings to this subject..... First, I am truly appreciative and grateful for the Board's humanistic attitude. I think it is beautiful and the Board's caring and concern for keeping two positions touches me deeply. Mahalo! However, that was on the condition that Alu Like would eventually pick us back up. Now the situation has changed. Our proposal was turned down....no ALU LIKE support. We now have to become pragmatic....There is definitely an abundance of heart, but unfortunately a lack of money! Keeping this in mind, and treating the subject realistically, I want to strongly suggest that rather than lose two positions, you keep one and that one should be Marlene. Let me assure you that I feel very comfortable about Marlene staying on board and my position terminating, and I want you to feel the same. I will still help out on a voluntary basis when I can.

I have worked with Marlene for one year and I have witnessed her talents and skills and I could go on ad infinitum on all the reasons why you should knock yourselves out to keep her working full time. It would be an unfortunate lost to the PVS not to take immediate steps to find ways to generate monies, THIS WEEK AND NEXT, so that our 'ohana can keep their PVS office in operation.



Aloha Mr. Tongg:

Thank you very much for your letter dated May 21, regarding sailing Hokole'a at Kona Village Resort.

Unfortunately the group of physicians in Kona will be a small group, and it will not be possible to pay speakers fees; I hope we can do this when we have a bigger group and more funds.

Four our group of Doctors next October, lectures and cultural shows are not important, in fact we can do without the cultural shows.

The most important thing is to sail on Hokole'a with a polynesian captain and polynesian sailors who are experienced seamen, when sailing the Hokole'a the sailors can show their guests how to handle the canoe, how to light a fire and cook a fish (we probably can get fresh fish from the kitchen in Kona Village), show them how to open a coconut and drink the water, etc.

Please answer these questions:

1. How many crewmen will the Hokole'a have, can she sail with a captain and two crewmen?
2. Is it possible to paddle Hokole'a in dead calm weather or is she too big?
3. Can we use the Hokole'a in the mornings for two hours and in the afternoon for two hours so we can take two groups of people sailing every day.
4. What is the maximum number of guests Hokole'a can carry safely and comfortably for two hours only?

I hope to meet you soon in Hawaii to discuss other projects that might benefit the Polynesian Voyaging Society.

Once again thanks very much for your help and advice.

RE: To clarify the objectives and goals of the Polynesian Voyaging Society and provide a plan for implementation.

PROBLEM AREAS:

1. Clarification and understanding of our purpose and goals.
2. Lack of objectives and tasks necessary to achieve the organizational goals.

FACTS & BACKGROUND:

The Articles of Incorporation provide for the following purposes:

1. To sponsor, or conduct, or both, research on the manner in which Polynesian seafarers settled Hawaii and other Pacific Islands by investigating through experimental and other means the canoes, navigation systems and other technical and cultural factors that enabled the Polynesians to undertake successful voyages of discovery and settlement.
2. To disseminate the resultant research findings by producing or publishing, or both, articles in scientific journals, books, films and other instruments of communication in order to inform the public about Polynesian voyaging, and to make available data that might be useful to scientists and others engaged in maritime endeavors.

Nainoa Thompson, on November 4, 1976, submitted a lengthy list of goals and objectives which were later reduced to "8" objectives of the Polynesian Voyaging Society.

Since that time, no other studies have been done to determine whether or not our goals have become out-dated. After carefully reviewing whatever information¹ which was available to me, I have come up with several broad goals which would need approval by the membership.

Then, in order to accomplish these goals, the Board should set up immediate, short range, and long range objectives to accomplish our overall goals.

Just about all of the sources reviewed by this writer indicate that the purpose of the Polynesian Voyaging Society is toward the conducting of research and experimentation in all phases (means of travel--canoe; navigational systems; food; etc.) of Polynesian voyaging. In addition, said findings are directed toward educational purposes aimed at audiences ranging from children to scientific minds.

Since most of these studies were done over a year ago, there have been serious questions on the present goals and plans of the Polynesian Voyaging Society. Several questions which need to be answered are:

1. Is Hawaii and its people to be the primary beneficiaries of the Polynesian Voyaging Society? If so, shouldn't our activities and educational endeavors be geared toward Hawaii?

2. The present goal of the Polynesian Voyaging Society include research in the areas of long distance voyaging. Do we want to include inter-island voyaging as part of our goals.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

First, that the purpose clause of our organization be amended to provide for additional inter-island sailing. My reasons are as follows:

- a) Financially speaking, the preparation, time and cost for extended Polynesian voyages are extremely expensive.

b) Increased inter-island sails would be a lot more beneficial to Island people. With a decrease in the number of extended voyages and increase in island sails, many more people would have practical exposure.

c) Such programs would allow for better implementation of immediate and short term objectives, as well as consistent with training and educational objectives.

Second, that the purpose clause involving the dissemination of "resultant research findings" be amended to include the education of Hawaii's people. My reason for amending this paragraph would be to insure the welfare and education of Hawaii's people.

IMMEDIATE, SHORT RANGE AND LONG RANGE OBJECTIVES:

The long range objectives would be extended Polynesian voyages, which is, in fact, the main purpose for which the society was established. Research and educational material could be obtained from each voyage.

Short range and immediate range objectives could be established with inter-island sails, workshops and seminars.

It should also be noted that the objectives of the Education Committee could fit in well with this type of practical implementation plan. For instance, workshops and seminars could be placed in between voyages.

Lastly, the asthetic goals such as culture background, spirit, and friendship could be blended into immediate, short, and long range accomplishments.

The following are recommendations which the Coast Guard will come out with regarding the investigation of the incident. Therefore, I suggest that the following policies be adopted and forwarded to the Canoe Committee to be used as guidelines in the repairing and preparation of Hokule'a and crew for the Hawaii to Tahiti trip.

- Paul* a. All compartment hatch coamings shall be raised at least 10" ~~3/4~~ from the deck, and fibreglassed for reinforcement.
- Paul* b. That all compartment hatch covers shall be water-tight and tested satisfactorily. *not fibre glassed yet - needs further testing*
- c. That all deck scuppers shall have a freeing port area of not less than 9 square inches per running foot of bulwark. *Additional hole make in each*
- Planning* d. That spray shield shall be designed so that water, to the maximum extent reasonable, is deflected from the deck.
- Paul* e. That one fixed hand bilge pump be installed, capable of pumping not less than 30 GPM, in each of the following compartments (4) Nos. 1 port and starboard; and Nos. 7, port and starboard. These pumps should be capable of operation without removing the compartment hatch covers.
- Paul* f. A minimum of one portable hand bilge pump capable of pumping not less than 5 GPM shall be onboard available for use in any compartment.
- Planning* g. Crew members should be thoroughly trained in responding to emergency situations.
- Consider* h. It is suggested that we give consideration to the use of an escort vessel, in view of the fact that the Hokule'a is not constructed for safety, and, therefore, will never be completely safe by modern present-day standards.

The Coast Guard, with our cooperation, will monitor our progress in making the S/V Hokule'a safe for the intended voyage. It is my desire that we work together to overcome any hazards which have or may become apparent.

For your information I am enclosing a copy of a letter I sent to Mr. Dennis B. Kane, Chief, Television and Educational Films, National Geographic Magazine, Washington, D. C. Based on my conversation with Mr. Kane in Washington last month, this is the status of the unused Hokule'a film footage:

1. The entire unused footage is stored in the National Geographic Magazine film library in their Washington, D. C. headquarters, 17th & M Street.

2. It was confirmed to me that the footage is available to the PVS for utilization for educational purposes. Obviously, editing will be essential.

3. The footage is available to us for viewing in Washington and, as you will note, I am inquiring whether it is possible to have a copy sent to us to Honolulu, along with a transcript of the film notations.

As to our options for utilization, I would recommend consideration of the following:

1. After an examination of the content of the footage it should be edited into educationally appropriate segments. For example, there might be segments on food preparation, on canoe building, lashing, steering, navigation, mythology, etc.

2. Since this kind of work takes the expertise of a film producer, the PVS should initiate discussions with educational film producers, both in Hawaii and nationally, who may be interested in cooperating with us in this venture.

3. The finished product would be available to all schools in the State of Hawaii, to community groups, as well as to interested institutions on the mainland and abroad.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

For Noncommercial Activities Within Ala Moana Center

The Ala Moana Center Management is pleased to permit noncommercial activities to be conducted within Ala Moana Center by interested persons and organizations. Because of the many requests to conduct such activities within the Center and the limited areas available for such activities, the Center Management has adopted these Rules and Regulations for noncommercial activities within the Center.

The Center is owned and managed, through employees composing the Ala Moana Center Management, by Hawaiian Land Company, a division of Dillingham Corporation. Tenants of the Center comprise the Ala Moana Center Association.

1. Application for Permits.

(a) The commercial activities of Center tenants and their owners, officers, directors, employees, customers, and invitees are the primary activities of the Center. No person or organization shall conduct any other activity within the Center without first obtaining a permit for such other activity. Permits will be granted only for joint areas of the Center designated by the Center Management.

(b) Any person or organization may apply for a permit for noncommercial activity within the Center at the Ala Moana Center Association office at 3200 Ala Moana Center, Honolulu, Hawaii during the hours of 8:00 A.M. to 4:30 P.M., Monday through Friday. Applications shall be in the form set forth on the reverse side of these Rules and Regulations and shall be made no later than three days prior to the first day desired for such activity, provided that if equipment of the Center is requested application shall be made no later than fourteen days prior to the first day desired for such activity.

(c) In evaluating an application for a permit for noncommercial activities within the Center the Center Management shall consider the following: the kind of activity; the purpose of the activity; the number of participants expected; the dates, times and duration of the activity; the materials, equipment and other objects to be used in connection with the activity; the risk of injury to any person or property; the Center joint area desired; the flow of pedestrian and vehicular traffic in the desired joint area; the size and configuration of the desired joint area; the number of other applications for activities to be conducted within the Center during the same period; the risk of unreasonable interference with the commercial activities of Center tenants and their owners, officers, directors, employees, customers, and invitees; and other factors. No application for a reasonable noncommercial activity within the Center will be denied.

(d) If an application is for an activity which may reasonably be expected to risk public disorder or injury to any person or property or to require substantial cleaning, repairs or restoration in order to return an area of the Center to its condition existing immediately prior to the commencement of the desired activity, the Center Management may, as a condition to granting a permit, require security for the performance of the applicant's obligations as permittee under such permit and these Rules and Regulations. Such security shall be in a form satisfactory to the Center Management and may be a cash deposit, a bond, an insurance policy, or other adequate assurance of the applicant's performance.

2. Conditions of Permits. Permits granted to applicants are subject to the following conditions and may be revoked, in the discretion of the Center Management, upon any violation of any of such conditions:

(a) A permittee shall not conduct any activity (other than commercial activities of Center tenants and their owners, officers, directors, employees, customers and invitees) within the Center except as is specifically described in its permit.

(b) At all times during the conduct of the activity

described in its permit, a permittee shall have its permit available at the location of such activity. A permittee who uses a Center booth shall prominently display a notice of the hours of the activity described in its permit on a Center booth sign holder. A permittee shall not use any other sign within the Center unless used in a display area designated by the Center Management and unless made in a neat, professional manner. A permittee shall not use nails, screw-in hooks or thumb tacks on any wood surface.

(c) At all times while within the Center, a permittee shall act in a noncommercial, peaceful and lawful manner and shall obey all directions of Center security personnel.

(d) A permittee shall not damage or deface any property within the Center and, if any object is discarded, shall deposit such object in the Center's designated waste receptacles.

(e) A permittee shall not use physical force, abusive or offensive language, or threats against any person within the Center.

(f) A permittee shall not obstruct the free flow of pedestrian or vehicular traffic on walkways, sidewalks, stairways, escalators, roads, driveways, parking lots or any other area regularly used for such traffic within the Center.

3. Obligations of Permittees.

(a) Upon the cessation of the activity described in its permit, a permittee shall clean, repair and restore the area in which it conducted such activity to the condition existing immediately prior to the commencement of such activity.

(b) All costs and expenses of such cleaning, repairing and restoring and all out-of-pocket costs and expenses of the Ala Moana Center Association and Dillingham Corporation or any of its affiliate companies relating to or arising out of the permittee's activity (including without limitation all costs and expenses of maintaining order and protecting persons and property in the vicinity of such area during the conduct of such activity) shall be borne by the permittee and shall be promptly paid to the Center Management. Checks shall be made payable to the order of the Ala Moana Center Association or as otherwise specified by the Center Management.

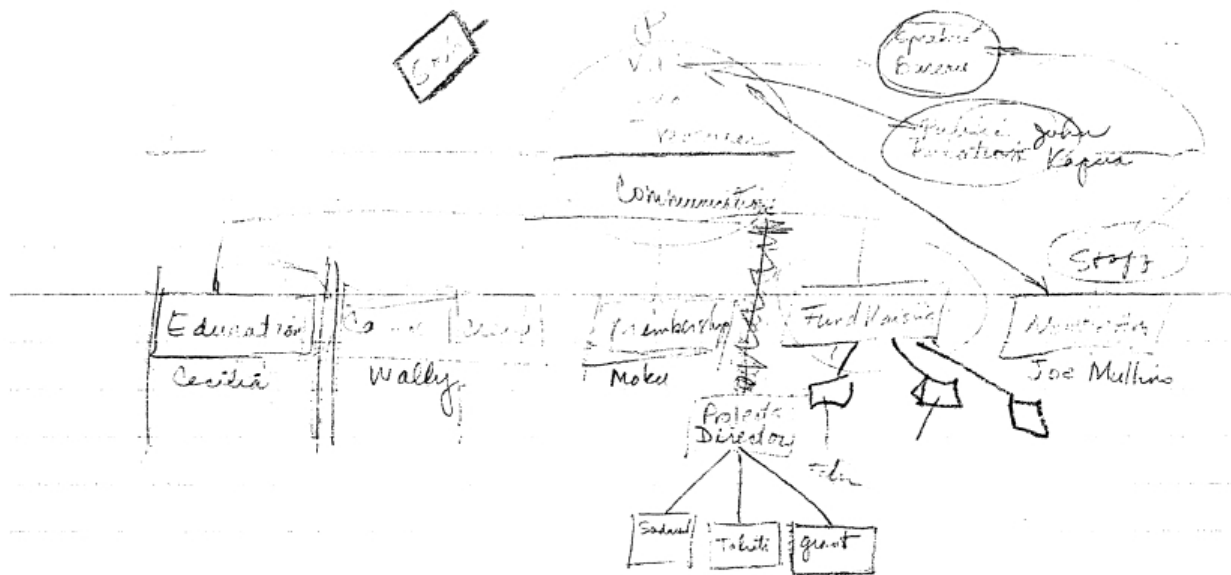
(c) A permittee assumes liability for and shall indemnify and hold harmless Dillingham Corporation and its affiliate companies (and their shareholders, officers, directors, employees, customers and invitees), tenants of the Center (and their owners, officers, directors, employees, customers and invitees) and the Ala Moana Center Association against and from any and all liabilities, obligations, losses, penalties, actions, suits, claims, damages, expenses, disbursements (including legal fees and expenses), or costs of any kind whatsoever in any way relating to or arising out of any activity of the permittee (including without limitation the activities of the permittee's members, officers, directors, employees, agents, contractors and servants) within the Center.

4. Non-Permitted Activity.

(a) If any person or organization enters the Center to conduct any activity (other than the commercial activities of Center tenants and their owners, officers, directors, employees, customers and invitees) without a permit, such person or organization is trespassing and shall be subject to arrest, ejectment and prosecution.

(b) If any permittee shall conduct any activity (other than the commercial activities of Center tenants and their owners, officers, directors, employees, customers and invitees) which is not described in such permittee's permit or which violates any term or condition of these Rules and Regulations, such permittee is trespassing and shall be subject to arrest, ejectment and prosecution, and the Center Management, in its sole discretion, may immediately revoke such permit.

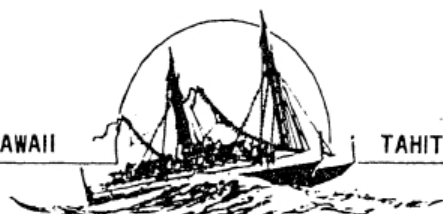

NARRATIVE

MOTIVATION: This proposal is motivated by several factors that when interrelated suggest a well-defined need that can be met within the context of a Marine program. These factors are: (1) Employment projections in marine careers are exceptionally good; (2) Native Hawaiians, in spite of a significantly impressive culturally based marine heritage, are grossly under represented in the field of marine careers; (3) The target area to be serviced by this proposal, Oahu's leeward coast, has a history of extremely high unemployment; (4) Academic achievement within the target area is very low, particularly among secondary level students; (5) Youth who come from families that have attempted to perpetuate culturally relevant marine traditions are frequently those who have the most difficulty in the school system; (6) It is highly unlikely that these youth, particularly native Hawaiians, will be prepared to take advantage of marine related employment opportunities if educational alienation continues; (7) A specially designed culturally based marine program can be the "bridge" between under-achieving alienated youth and post secondary learning institutions by providing the motivational & educational vehicle; (8) A marine program that incorporates the development of culture-based marine industries into a sequenced curriculum can be a significant added dimension in the area of vocational training; (9) The sponsoring organization has already completed much work in the area of curriculum development and methodology in its execution of culture based marine activity.

GOALS: While the achievement of the overall goals would extend beyond Sea Grant Year II we are specifically focusing on program development for Year II. The Goals for the funding year are as follows: (1) Provide a marine based alternative education program for low or non-achievers at the intermediate & secondary levels; (2) Further establish working linkages with the Department of Education Leeward District in the areas of release time student participation and accreditation; (3) Continue development of Hawaiian culture-based marine curriculum models designed to teach basic marine skills for possible statewide application; (4) Research & develop a culture-based vocational marine industries component to increase the relevancy factor of the educational process; (5) Establish ocean recreation services for the Leeward community; (6) Provide a vehicle for the dissemination of marine related information particularly in the areas of educational opportunities and employment in the field.

METHODS: Methods by which we will achieve our goals include but are not limited to the following: (1) Establish a volunteer advisory board composed of 50% Leeward community based participants and 50% at large participants to provide guidance and input; (2) Strengthen cooperative relationships with existing agencies and organizations that share the overlapping objectives, i.e., Family Court, Kamehameha Schools, Department of Education/Leeward District, Alu Like, Bluewater Marine Lab, Polynesian Voyaging Society, Department of Parks & Recreation, etc.; (3) Strengthen and formalize a program evaluation component; (4) Link the existing sponsoring agency curriculum models into a chronologically sequenced curriculum; (5) Develop student recruitment through a public information program and social agency referral system; (6) Continue seeking out Leeward community resources; (7) Emphasize recruitment of a Leeward community-based instructor corps that meet the qualifying standards; (8) Sponsoring agency contributions of significant in-kind services, i.e., clerical staff, fully equipped maintenance shop, tools & equipment, sea craft, existing instructor staff, etc.; (9) Intergrate & Inter-relate the three major program components which are Education, Recreation, and Industry.

SECOND

Present Reading

Section 10. Removal of Members, Director or Officers. Any member, director or other officer may be removed from the membership or from office by affirmative vote of two-thirds of a quorum at any regular or special meeting called for that purpose for conduct detrimental to the interest of the corporation, for lack of sympathy with its objective, or for refusal to render reasonable assistance in carrying out its purposes. Any such member, officer or director proposed to be removed, shall be entitled to at least five (5) days notice in writing by mail of the meeting at which such removal is to be voted upon, and shall be entitled to appear before and be heard at such meeting.

Proposed Reading

Section 10. Removal of Members, Director or Officers. In case of any vacancies in the Board of Directors, including temporary vacancies caused by the illness of directors or the absence of directors from the Island of Oahu, the remaining members of the Board of Directors (Although less than a majority thereof) may fill the same by the affirmative vote of a majority of such remaining members, subject, however, to the provisions of Section 11 of this Article III. In case of any temporary vacancy aforesaid, such temporary vacancy shall be filled only for the period of the incapacity of the director whose place is being filled and/or until the termination of his illness or his return to the Island of Oahu.

THIRD

I suggest that no amendment be made to Distribution on Dissolution.

The Polynesian Voyaging Society extends its aloha to the participants of the 1977 USVBA National Championships being held in Hilo.

Our voyaging canoe, Hokule'a, will be in Hilo until May 14th and all of you are invited to view her and talk with crew members. Docked at the Naniloa Surf Hotel on Banyan Drive, open house if from 9 a.m. to 12 noon, Monday to Friday. Arrangements for groups can be made by calling Blossom Kahawai at the Naniloa Surf, #935-0831.

Hokule'a, "Star of Gladness", is the Hawaiian name for Arcturus, the zenith star of these islands. When Hokule'a was directly overhead, the Polynesian navigator knew he was in the latitude of the Hawaiian Islands.

The canoe is 60 feet in length, a replica of the ancient double-hulled sailing vessels which were used for voyaging between Hawaii and Tahiti. The Hokule'a was built for the express purpose of making a voyage between Hawaii and Tahiti using Polynesian navigational methods and accomplished this feat during the American Bicentennial summer. She has helped to recapture the spirit of skills, such as non-instrument navigation, which have been vanishing. Canoes such as Hokule'a have probably not sailed these waters for more than 500 hundred years. But she is now on a trip from island to island, stopping in the various districts to be shared with the people of Hawaii--to whom she belongs.

Dear Mr. Yamamoto:

The Polynesian Voyaging Society has designated me as the Project Director for the purposes of coordinating the sending of two of our young men to Satawal to learn more of techniques of survival at sea, building of canoes, and non-instrumental celestial navigation. Due to several emergencies that have come up (one of the young men had a condition known as pneumothorax which required surgery), we have had to delay sending the young men to Satawal until the early part of next spring. Not much activity is carried on during the winter months so it would be a waste of time (according to the Satawalese) for these two to depart for Micronesia any earlier than February, 1978. Thus, this represents our target date at this time.

The following is an estimated budget for the successful completion of this project:

Satawal is a subsistence economy and it is difficult to determine how much of a burden these two young men would be on the island. We are not taking any chances and are having them bring their own food. We would not want to tax the food supplies of this island.

We have been advised by many of the former Peace Corps members, immigration officials, education officials, and cultural anthropologists that the giving of gifts would permit an easier entry for two young men. It is a virtual necessity to proceed with this mechanism to obtain the approval of tribal chiefs from whom permission would be required to enter Satawal.

The two young men have undergone considerable medical training and virtually no health care delivery is available. Thus, they are being trained to care for any emergency that might arise and are currently being taught the use of various medicines.

As part of their training for survival, these two young men are undergoing a rigorous course to obtain their Ham radio license. We anticipate that communication between Satawal and Hawaii is feasible and possible and this training will also benefit crew members later on any future ocean voyage on Hokule'a. This figure represents the bare minimum for emergency radio equipment.

The cost of a round trip air travel to Yap is \$733. There is also the cost for freighter booking from Yap to Satawal and this amount is estimated at \$444. Thus, the total amount for travel is $\$733 \times 2 = \$1,466$ plus \$444 freighter travel for two.

The Polynesian Voyaging Society has been in existence since 1974, attempting to provide the thrust in research and experiments in Polynesian Settlement and Voyaging. Thus far, we have made a contribution in the testing of settlement theories; gathered a substantial amount of information on navigation and early survival; developed some understanding of cultural values and approaches; and engaged in conducting statewide educational activities for both school children and adults over the past two years through the use of the Hokule'a. Prior to that, volunteers engaged in speaking to

All of these activities were accomplished primarily through the spirit of people who gave of their time and resources. The historical voyage of the Hokule'a gained national and international attention. Some of it was negative; but most of our achievements pioneered new avenues of thought and expression.

We have published four childrens' books and a teachers' guide. Two films were the result of our efforts. We have several slide presentations and are presently revising and improving on these. We are in the process of publishing another book and building our reservoir of classroom curriculum. Former crew members and new volunteers squeeze time from their busy schedule and assist by giving presentations to groups and schools.

We are in a new phase of our development. The exciting and adventurous first voyage is now behind us. We know that there is merit to ancient chants. We have tested the words of our ancient chants through the success of our Kealaikahiki experiment which showed a much more effective route in launching a canoe to other Pacific islands. With the excitement behind, we are now setting plans to continue our

educational contributions. The wealth of information we've collected; the use of the Hokule'a as a classroom and training tool; and the need to generate more educational visits to the Hokule'a requires an even greater attention to the Hokule'a's future.

The Polynesian Voyaging Society has always operated on limited funds. For the past year and a half, we have struggled to keep the Hokule'a maintained and sailing. Our clerical support has been minimal, reducing our effectiveness to the degree of concern. We have been hard pressed to provide financial compensation to experienced and dedicated people on a regular basis, thereby relying on time available to properly facilitate educational activities and canoe maintenance. We want to do more on a consistent basis.

An administrative secretary is essential to provide the stability in our daily operations. We have had to operate with sincere but unskilled assistance.

I had asked Marlene to inquire into the termination notice, and was informed that their status as employees were at a standstill

The Hokule'a was relaunched from drydock on Wednesday, July 12, 1978 at which time Leon Sterling blessed the canoe with Hawaiian salt, then taken to Pier 12 where she is presently moored.

The additional persons have been hired making a total of five seapersons and a supervisor.

The gunnels (mo'o) have been completed and tied, painted, all caulked, with the cap rail varnished and looks great.

All necessary bamboo have been replaced and the deck planks oiled.

Both #4 hatches have had u-bolts, cables and locks installed for on-board security of equipment.

Outboard motor controls have been installed for ease of operation and a large approved gas tank purchased for use aboard.

At present all equipment is being sanded and refinished such as, masts, spars, booms, outboard iako planks, steering sweeps, etc. This being done at Kamehameha Schools shop area.

Training classes for men have been set up and scheduled.

PROGRESS REPORT

On July 12, 1978, Hokule'a was launched from Keehi Drydock. Due to the time element (hour's notice from the drydock) it was virtually impossible to notify all the Board members. However, Michael Tongg, Wally Froseith, Moku Froseith, myself and Keola Jones (trainee) were on hand to give a prayer before she was lowered into the water.

At 2:10 P.M. the same day, Keola, myself and Joanne Sterling moved the canoe over to her permanent berth at Pier 12.

Reported below is the progress of Hokule'a:

HULLS

Re-sanded, prepare for a second coat of Z-Spar Mahogany brown.

Note: Due to the inexperience of trainees to achieve a mirror finish, an expert boat painter was hired from the yard to paint the final coat on the hulls.

HULLS (continued)

Anti-fouling paint has been applied to the hulls, at what is estimated to be the water line. When the canoe is fully rigged which will add more weight to her, a new water line must be painted on, either by haul out or a mud flat at low tide.

MANU'S

Three coats of Z-Spar Ivory Shell were used on the manu's. Method of painting: paint, sand, re-paint, etc.

MO'O'S

Three coats of Z-Spar Ivory Shell, on the gunwales, one coat is needed. Cap rails painted with clear varnish, six coats were applied, one only is needed.

STEERING PADDLES

Sanded, Five more coats of clear varnish will complete the process.

STANCHION POSTS

Planned to shape, sanded, re-fit and to be lashed in place. Varnish seven coats are needed.

SAFETY RAILS

Rails are located on the stanchion posts. Five more coats of varnish, still in process.

CAULKING

Mo'o's were lashed in place and caulked. Areas to be caulked: manu cross pieces, inside mo'o, lash holes.

ENGINE LOCATION AND OPERATION

Coast Guard regulations requires that the canoe be equipped with an engine to maneuver into ports. It would be impossible to control a five to seven ton vessel coming into a dock using just the sails especially in heavy air.

The mount for the Johnson 40 HP engine is of a highly sophisticated design. In order to operate the engine, one must sit on the hood of the engine operating it with body control. It leaves the operator with little or no sight of direction, obstructions, in-coming vessels or proper alignment for docking. One had to rely on a crew member on deck for directions,

ENGINE LOCATION AND OPERATION (continued)

Due to several near collisions it was felt that a set of controls must be added to insure crew and vessel safety at all times. Now installed aft of the canoe is a single lever control to operate the throttle and gears. The steering is done through the tiller set up. Both the controls are mounted on deck, port side, and in now way interfering with any of the normal operational procedures conducted on board. Helmsman now has a clear sight and judgement of any situation that may occur.

Work will be divided between the canoe at Pier 12 and the Kamehameha Schools.

Note: Pier 12 lacks the facilities of water, electric power and parking, and NO SECURITY FOR THE CANOE.

Recommendation: To install and build onto the existing floating dock, a barricade with use of lock and key.

CONCLUSION

The Polynesian Voyaging Society should be made aware that the canoe has just a few hand tools and nothing in the way of power tools. Mr. Wally Froeseith and myself have during this time been able to operate on what we both have. Power tool rentals incurred at the drydock is due to what we both lack in our stock. Mr. Alex Jakubenko took it upon himself in allowing me to use the drydock workshop to conduct all of the canoe's reconstruction on the woodwork. It is one of Amfac's policies that the workshop is for employee's only.

I wish to express that without the use of Kamehameha School's canoe workshop the Society would be without the proper working tools. It is gratifying to know that the canoe, HOKULE'A will continue to bring about the beliefs of her existence.





SUBJECT: Proposal to Send Two Individuals to Satawal

I. OBJECTIVE

I would like to propose that in anticipation of the 1978 voyage to Tahiti, two individuals be selected to be sent to Satawal to be trained under Mau Pialug to learn techniques of non-instrumental navigation, building of canoes, fishing, etc. These two selected individuals in turn would be responsible for the navigation of Hokule'a to Tahiti and return in 1978.

II. BACKGROUND

On my recent trip to Yap, I met with several key individuals regarding this proposal and all were positive about such an experience. In particular, Mike McCoy, former Peace Corps worker and nephew-in-law to Mau was in favor of such a learning experience and would help us coordinate whatever was needed. The immigration officials have also been contacted in addition to the educational officials in Yap. All that is required now is for board action and formal requests to be submitted to Mau and the residents of Satawal, officials of the Trust Territory, and to Mike McCoy.

III. ANTICIPATED PROBLEMS

A. Individuals to be Selected

It is no secret that we have had considerable difficulties with some individuals who have flaunted responsibility (failing to take watch, lack of concern about safety, irresponsible attitude as far as smuggling illicit drugs on board Hokule'a). Mike McCoy has stated that he has considerable reservations about several former Hokule'a crewmen.

B. Non-scheduled Freighter to Satawal

The trainees selected will need to be housed in Yap until the freighter is ready to make the outer islands trip. Mike McCoy has volunteered to provide a place for the two individuals until the freighter is ready to leave to Satawal.

C. Protocol

There are strained relations between outer islanders and Yapese. We will need to approach several chiefs in Yap District to request permission for our trainees to stay on Satawal. Gifts would not be out of order.

D. Living Arrangements on Satawal

The atoll is small and the natives are on a subsistence economy. Thus, the expense and strain on the hosts (residents of Satawal) would not be that great. However, we should be considerate and have the trainees take in gifts such as nets, hooks, ropes, etc. Mike McCoy said he could give us a list of individuals whom we should present with gifts.

IV. BUDGET

Air fare to Yap is approximately \$700. Freightier ride to Satawal will amount to approximately \$100. Thus transportation alone will total \$800 for each trainee. Miscellaneous expenses should be provided each trainee for about \$200 each. I would estimate that about \$2000 should be allocated for gifts to the islanders.

V. OBLIGATIONS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

A. On Polynesian Voyaging Society

Since we will be, in essence, sponsoring the trainees, it is incumbent upon us to select only individuals in whom we have utmost trust, respect, and who see responsibility as a top priority.

B. On Individuals Selected

There should be no doubt that there is an expectation for the trainees to fully understand that they will undertake the non-instrumental navigational responsibilities for 1978 down to Tahiti and back to Hawaii and ALSO be responsible to pass on this acquired knowledge to prospective crewmen who will be found among the people of Hawaii. It is anticipated that some methodology be developed to train yet more people in non-instrumental navigation.

VI. TIME SCHEDULE

I am proposing that August, 1977 be the target date for the initiation of this "mini-project." This will provide us with sufficient time to plan effectively. I have spoken to David Yamamoto, executive director of the State Foundation for History and the Humanities and he has no objections to the use of funds (in the event approved) for the traineeship.

VII. RECOMMENDATIONS

- A. After discussion and ironing out of the "kinks", I would hope that the Board of Directors act positively on this proposal.

B. I would like to recommend the two individuals whom we should seriously consider sending to Satawal, both of whom have been approached by me and are willing to go, both of whom have the endorsement of Mike McCoy, and both of whom realize that my approaching them in no way construes acceptance. The final approval and recommendation must come from the Board of Directors. These two individuals are: Nainoa Thompson and Shorty Bertleman.

Founded in 1974, the Polynesian Voyaging Society has operated, as a non-profit organization with a Board of Directors that is presently headed by President Michael A. Tongg. For the past four years, Marlene Among has acted as their only employee working part-time to coordinate activities and running the office at the Bishop Museum. The Polynesian Voyaging Society has developed unique educational materials for use in Hawaii's schools, has supported a speaker's bureau, and has continued to carry out research projects related to the ancient skills and cultures of Polynesians.

Last year approximately 6,000 students boarded the double-hulled canoe, Hokule'a, as part of the Sea Trek program at Heeia State Park. That successful experience has stimulated plans for further development of educational programs using the Hokule'a at Heeia.

At the most recent meeting of the Board of Directors of the Polynesian Voyaging Society it was agreed that formal application for use of facilities at Heeia State park should be made at this time.

The Polynesian Voyaging Society is presently developing an educational program in conjunction with the marine studies program of the Department of Education. The program as is now being planned will be implemented in Kaneohe Bay during the early part of the school year 1982-83. Mainly for that reason, we are anxious to establish an agreement for facilities as soon as possible.

Physically, we need a mooring space for the Hokule'a, office space, storage space for canoe equipment, and a room for lectures and exhibits.

If Hokule'a were allowed to be moored in its previous location, the building at the top of the nearby foot path would be ideal for use as an office and lecture/exhibit hall. There artifacts collected by the Society and the curriculum materials could be displayed for the benefit and use of the public and students participating in related programs. Films and other visual presentations would also be shown there. The area behind the public restrooms might be considered for storage of the canoe equipment.

The facility will be staffed by the part-time director, Marlene Among, and the education program instructor, Robert Gay. Depending on availability of continued funding a bookkeeper/secretary and a canoe maintenance person may also be hired.

The Polynesian Voyaging Society is looking forward to the change in direction this proposal represents for them. Naturally, they would like as secure and as long a lease as is possible. If accepted, this will provide an appropriate home for a project that has become a significant symbol of the Hawaiian culture. Your consideration of this request will be greatly appreciated.

Your formal application for use of the He'eia State Park facilities was considered by the Friends of He'eia State Park at our last meeting on September 7, 1982. The Friends are very interested in welcoming the Polynesian Voyaging Society to the Park and in establishing an agreement for facilities use.

Your request for a mooring space for the Hokule'a should be pursued with the Department of Land and Natural Resources. Your request for office space, a room for lectures and exhibits, and storage space for canoe equipment can be granted, however the following conditions must be agreed upon:

- a. The office space and the room for the lectures and exhibits will be granted on a non-exclusive use basis and must be used for educational/cultural purposes.
 - 1). The exhibits must not be permanent.
