

POLYNESIAN VOYAGING SOCIETY

The Polynesian Voyaging Society, a unique non-profit community organization, was founded in 1973. The charter of incorporation of the Society was granted by the State of Hawai'i (September 13, 1973) and states that the purposes of the Society are:

- 1) to sponsor or conduct, or both, research on the manner in which Polynesian seafarers settled Hawai'i and other Pacific Islands by investigating through experimental and other means the canoes, navigation systems and other technical and cultural factors that enabled the Polynesians to undertake successful voyages of discovery and settlement;
- 2) and to disseminate the resultant research findings by producing or publishing, or both, articles in scientific journals, books, films and other instruments of communication in order to inform the public about Polynesian voyaging, and to make available data that might be useful to scientists and others engaged in maritime endeavors.

HOKULE'A

A replica of an ancient voyaging craft was constructed to test and document theories and knowledge of the traditional skills related to Polynesian voyaging. This voyaging canoe, Hokule'a (The Star of Gladness), became a warm and life-size realization of a people.

Hokule'a is a large double-hulled canoe, 60 feet long, weighing five and one-half tons, with crab claw sails, and double masts. The hulls are made of cross beams to

in, and respect for, the knowledge and skills of the ancient mariners.

1980

Hokule'a again made a long voyage (Hawai'i - Tahiti - Hawai'i) of approximately 6,000 miles. For the first time in perhaps 1000 years, a young Hawaiian was able to successfully navigate in the ancient way along the longest sea route known to have been sailed in ancient times. Just imagine the challenge of such a voyage without the use of any instruments (time pieces, charts, and ~~put~~ included) to aid in the navigation of the Hokule'a.

FINANCIAL CONDITION

It is the stated intention of the Board of Directors that everything concerned with the canoe be done first-class. While it may be expensive in the short run, quality makes for a safer vessel, and savings in the long run.

As an example, ^{the Society} PVS decided to undergo a total revamping of Hokule'a in 1982 rather than face a series of small repairs in the years to come. Illustrative is the quality of the new i'ako. The old i'ako consisted of 10 laminations...and by 1980, cracks were becoming painfully obvious. The two i'ako that bore the weight of the two masts actually sagged in the middle. Therefore, PVS specified that the new i'ako contain 20 laminations each...with the two i'ako bearing the weight of the masts to have 28 laminations. This gives the new i'ako of Hokule'a both added strength and flexibility. Costly, yes, but best for the long run.

Another example is the manner that Hokule'a is being re-fitted for her new

Hokule'a became a project of total community involvement and achieved for the people of Hawai'i a cultural revitalization and inspirational impact far exceeding the original concept. Hokule'a has successfully demonstrated theories regarding Polynesian voyaging and enlightened the general public about Polynesian migration and settlement. The famous canoe has generated widespread interest throughout the Pacific, and elsewhere, and is a symbol of the people of Hawai'i and a legend in its own time.

1976

In 1976, Hokule'a sailed from Hawai'i to Tahiti and returned to Hawai'i successfully. This voyage was a navigational feat of approximately 6,000 miles and tested both the sailing capabilities of the vessel and ancient navigational skills. The voyage was guided entirely by knowledge of wind, currents and stars. These skills were tested, authenticated and documented for posterity and occasioned a resurgence

If the old materials were deemed too worn from the constant exposure to the salt elements, new replacements were bought. Other costly items included flares, electric distress signals, air horns, many flashlights, extra dacron line, nautical and tide charts, fire extinguishers (3), tool sets, gas tanks, life preservers, navigation lites, etc. Subsequent expenditures include anchors, tarpaulins, bilge pumps, side-stern-masthead lights, VHF Radio/Receiver/antenna, batteries, foul weather gear, etc.

After umpteen attempts to repair PVS' outboard motor, it has been deemed useless after failing again off Lanai on 3-26-83. Thus, PVS has purchased a new outboard motor. Such a motor, while at first glance inconsistent with traditional navigation objectives, is necessary for Coast Guard approval to sail between and into various island ports. *Hokule'a* PVS also needs new sails.

What does this all mean? It means that alot of money is needed. PVS has depleted its treasury to re-fit Hokule'a. At an April Board meeting, the Directors authorized PVS to borrow \$7,000+ as a loan. While First Hawaiian Bank has afforded us extremely favorable interest repayment rates, the fact

remains that PVS is now substantially in debt and needs your help.

"FRIENDS OF HOKULE'A"

"FRIENDS OF HOKULE'A" are interested individuals or parties who are willing to make a tax deductible contribution of at least \$100 between now and the end of September to keep the Polynesian Voyaging Society and the Hokule'a afloat for the next school year.

1. Continue providing speakers throughout Hawai'i's schools to complement curriculum related to Hawaiian studies and further promote the many skills related to Polynesian voyaging.
2. Continue developing educational materials for use in the classroom and revision of the "Polynesian Seafaring Heritage" book in which you will be acknowledged.
3. Continue lectures and presentations to the adult community and interested organizations.
4. Finding a suitable home for Hokule'a and continuing field trips by students and teachers to the canoe.
5. Continue sailing Hokule'a inter-island to share the canoe with all of Hawai'i. Develop and train a cadre of people who can sail the Hokule'a and also take advantage of conducting research while at sea.
6. Plan another long voyage to continue research and study in the area of non-instrumental navigation and apply knowledge and skills of early Polynesian mariners in today's world of modern technology.
7. Continue to allow Hawai'i to be a cultural leader for all Pacific people via the efforts of the Society and the voyages of the Hokule'a
