A BILL FOR AN ACT

MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR A CANOE SAILING TRAINING PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. There is appropriated out of the general
2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the ~~sum of \$200,000~~ or so much
3 thereof as may be necessary, for purposes related to the
4 establishment of ~~a canoe sailing training program~~ intended
5 to instill the spiritual feelings of the ocean-going culture
6 of Hawaii. The target group of the program is approximately
7 100 children and youth of whom approximately one-half shall
8 be from low-income families as determined by the department
9 of education or other approximate agency.

10 SECTION 2. The sum appropriated shall be expended by the

Your Committee on Culture and the Arts to which was referred H.B. No. 1470 entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR A CANOE SAILING TRAINING PROGRAM.", begs leave to report as follows:


The purpose of this bill is to provide \$10,000 for the establishment of a canoe sailing program intended to instill the spiritual feelings of the ocean-going culture of Hawaii in children and youth, one-half of which shall be from low-income families (as determined by the Department of Education) for the fiscal year 1978-79.

Your Committee amended Section 2 of the bill by replacing the "Double-Hulled Canoe Hui" with "KUMU NUI MA KE KAI" to identify the non-profit organization making the request by their incorporated name.

Your Committee further amended Section 2 by designating June 30, 1980 as the lapsing date for any unexpended or unencumbered balance.

Your Committee on Culture and the Arts is in accord with the intent and purpose of H.B. No. 1470 as amended herein, and recommends that it pass Second Reading in the form attached hereto as H.B. No. 1470, H.D. 1, and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR OCEAN AND CELESTIAL NAVIGATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. There is appropriated out of the general
2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$100,000, or
3 so much thereof as may be necessary, for the Polynesian
4 Voyaging Society to sail the Hokule'a to Tahiti and back
5 for the purpose of doing research on ocean and celestial
6 navigation.

7 SECTION 2. The sum appropriated shall be expended
8 by the department of planning and economic development for
9 the purposes of this Act. All sums appropriated under this
10 Act which are not expended or encumbered by June 30, 1980
11 shall lapse into the general fund.

12 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Senator T. C. Yim and Committee:

During the past year the Hokule'a navigator and I spent hundreds of hours in the Bishop Museum, where I am a lecturer, in sailing back and forth to Tahiti on truly a dry run. We have been searching for clues as to how the Polynesians of old may have used the stars in finding remote islands over thousands of kilometers of open sea and return - - all without the use of instruments.

Such research has led to new knowledge of the use of sky never before described in the literature - - knowledge of steering stars, meridian markers, changes in the rising and setting places of stars as we change latitude, and the "cut of the moon" as a way of latitude determination.

We have lots of data. A voyage will enable us to test the hypotheses we have developed. We will eventually encode the relevant information in chant and dance as the ancients did. The eminent chanter, Kaupena Wong, is working with us. Early navigation chants no longer exist. They were probably Tahitian, and we must certainly involve Tahitians in the project.

Voyages of Hokule'a will add weight and credence to the findings of Dr. Kenneth Emory and Dr. Yoshi Sinoto, who, through careful correlation of fishhooks and poi pounders, have determined some of the ancient routes of settlement of Polynesia. That work is held in highest regard throughout the Pacific.

Micronesians are, in some places, still sailing noninstrumentally.

We have much we can learn from them, and they, in turn, from us. It was Mau Pialug who guided the Hokule'a to Tahiti and back in 1976.

The ways of wind, wave, and stars can be taught to those in Hawaii as well as other islands of the Pacific. Such knowledge might well help foster a greater respect for Polynesian culture.

The brightest star in the sky, Sirius ('A'a) goes over Tahiti, the center of Polynesian culture. The brightest star in the northern hemisphere, Arcturus (Hokule'a) goes over Hawaii. So Hokule'a in its widest aspects of research, can help Pacific islanders gain a knowledge of the evolution of ocean engineering as expressed in ancient craft, as well as an respect for intellectual accomplishment of their forebears.

Such endeavors will further our relationship with the Peoples of the Pacific, add to the research findings at the Bishop Museum, and may result in a resurgence of interest in exploring old routes to ancient roots in Polynesia.

I strongly urge support of Senate Bill 1491.

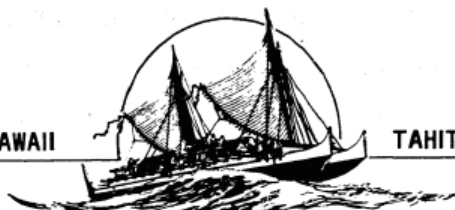

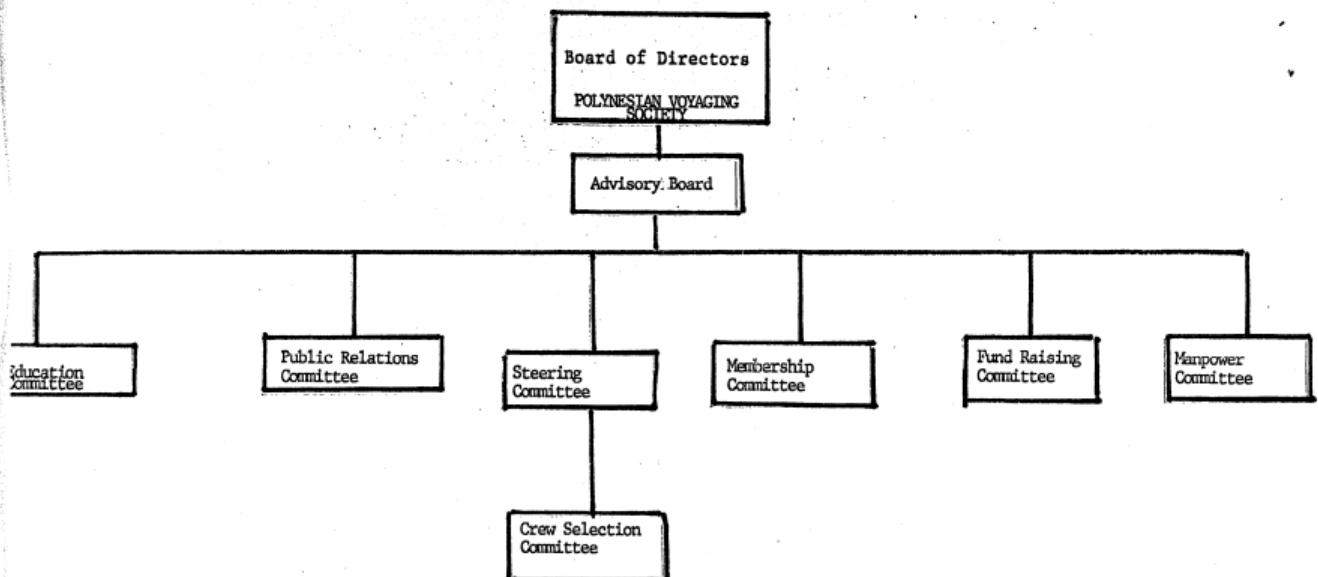

C. Brief statement of organization's purpose and objective: The purpose of this corporation are :

- a. To sponsor or conduct, or both, research on the manner in which Polynesian seafarers settled in Hawaii and other Pacific islands by investigating through experimental and other means the canoes, navigation systems, and other technical and cultural factors that enable the Polynesians to undertake successful voyages of discovery and settlement;
- b. and to disseminate the resulted research finding by producing or publishing, or both, articles in scientific journals, books, films, and other instruments of communication such as public workshops for both public and private schools, free of charge, in order to inform them about ancient Polynesian voyaging and to make available to the people of Hawaii and the United States available data that might be useful for cultural, scientific, and other maritime endeavors.

The objectives of this corporation are:

- a. To further test and document the Hawaii-Tahiti-Hawaii route without instrumentation and compare the non-instrumental voyage with instrument control on board;
- b. to document traditional navigational techniques and compare the results using modern day navigational aids and tracking systems;
- c. to substantiate travel patterns of the early Hawaiians which are still regarded as theoretical;
- d. to develop a training and education program for prospective crew members and the general public; and,
- e. to conduct cultural and economic voyaging exchanges to strengthen and enhance ties between United States, Hawaii in particular and Polynesia.

In June 1979, a 3 month training program was instituted for the training and selection of the crew members for the proposed voyage of the Hokule'a in 1980. REQUEST FOR STATE FUNDS BY NONGOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATIONS

GENERAL INFORMATION AND INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMPLETING APPLICATION FORMS

The 1978 Constitutional Convention amended the constitutional provisions governing appropriation of public funds by amending Article VII, Section 4 of the State Constitution. The section now provides that:

"No tax shall be levied or appropriation of public money made, nor shall the public credit be used, directly or indirectly, except for a public purpose. No grant shall be made in violation of Section 4 of Article I of this constitution. No grant of public money or property shall be made except pursuant to standards provided by law."

The constitutional amendment requires closer scrutiny by the Legislature of public funds appropriated to non-governmental organizations.

INTERIM STANDARDS

The following interim measures have been established to comply with the constitutional mandate. Organizations requesting state funding are required to comply with the following:

- A. To agree to the conditions listed below.
 - (1) Compliance with all applicable federal and state laws prohibiting discrimination against any person, on the grounds of race, color, national origin, religion, creed, sex or age, in employment and any condition of employment with the recipient or in participation in the benefits of any program or activity funded by the State;
 - (2) Compliance with all applicable licensing requirements of the state and federal governments, and with all applicable accreditation and other standards of quality generally accepted in the field of the recipient's activities;
 - (3) Have in its employ or under contract persons professionally qualified to engage in the activity funded by the State;
 - (4) Compliance with such other requirements as the Director of Finance may prescribe to ensure adherence by the provider or recipient with federal and state laws and to ensure quality in the service or activity rendered by the recipient; and
 - (5) Allow the expending or related state agency, the finance committees of the House and the Senate, and the Legislative Auditor, full access to records, reports, files, and other related documents in order that they may monitor and evaluate the management and fiscal practices of the recipient organization to assure proper and effective expenditure of state funds.
- B. To complete the attached application forms which provide information on the organization, its program and its financial situation. (This information will assist the Legislature in assessing the organization's program for which state funds are being requested and facilitate the preparation of the general appropriations bill and other appropriation bills).
- C. To keep accurate accounts of all receipts and expenditures and to have its accounts audited at least once each fiscal year by an independent Certified Public Accountant.

GENERAL INFORMATION

- A. To facilitate legislative management, funding of individual nongovernmental organizations will be consolidated and appropriated as part of the supplemental budget bill. Therefore, appropriation bills for individual organizations will generally be held up in the finance committees of the House and the Senate and those approved will be incorporated into the House or the Senate version of the supplemental budget bill.
- B. The State budgets and appropriates funds by programs classified in twelve major program areas: economic development, employment, transportation facilities and services, environmental protection, health, social problems, lower education/higher education, culture and recreation, public safety, individual rights and government-wide support. To facilitate integration of organization funding into the State's program structure, organizations are required to submit a separate request for each program (defined in terms of different objectives and/or target groups) for which funds are being requested. For example, a community services organization requesting state funds for its alternative education program and its mental health counseling program must submit separate requests for each.
- C. The State's budget is on a fiscal year basis beginning on July 1 and ending on June 30 of the following year. To facilitate integration, organizations' requests for funds and the information required on the various forms should be presented on a corresponding fiscal year basis.
- D. Requests for funds allowed under this application procedure are limited to funds for an organization's operational expenses only. Since capital improvement project expenditures involve additional factors that must be considered, such requests will be considered through a separate application process.
- E. Completed application forms are due no later than 5:00 p.m. on February 22, 1980. Please submit two completed sets of forms to:

PUBLIC SUPPORT & REVENUE - Page 1

Contributions (Line 1)

All contributions received directly from donors and not resulting from a federated fund raising campaign. Contributions include only amounts for which the donor receives no direct private benefits (as distinguished from membership dues and program service fees which represent payments made in return for direct private benefits). Examples include contributions from individuals; corporations and businesses; foundations and trusts; fraternal, civic, social and other unrelated groups; contributions in response to door-to-door, mail and other solicitations conducted by an organization itself; and excess amounts paid over regular membership fees.

Special Events (Line 2)

Support and incidental revenue derived from all of an organization's special fund-raising events during the reporting period. These are affairs in which something of value is offered directly to participants for a payment and contribution adequate to yield revenue for the sponsoring organization over and above direct costs and expenses. Examples include dinners, dances, bazaars, card parties, etc.

Legacies and Bequests (Line 3)

All gifts made through wills, e.g., gifts passing to the ownership of an organization by will after the death of a donor.

Revenue Collected Through Local Member Units (Line 4)

Some organizations obtain major financial support from fund-raising campaigns conducted by their local affiliates. All revenue obtained in this manner should be recorded here.

Revenue Contributed by Associated Organizations (Line 5)

Contributions from auxiliaries, circles, guilds, and other organizations closely associated with the reporting organization. It should not include membership payments in the form of dues or assessments.

Revenue Allocated by Federated Fund-Raising Organizations (Line 6)

All allocations, appropriations and other forms of financial support received or receivable from federated fund-raising organizations.

Revenue Allocated by Non-Associated and Non-Federated Fund-Raising Organizations (Line 7)

All allocations, appropriations and other forms of financial support received or receivable from non-associated and non-federated fund-raising organizations.

Fees and Grants from Government Agencies (Line 8)

All support and revenue that an organization receives from governmental sources, including purchase of services, fees and contract payments, research, and other grants from local, state and federal agencies. Amounts displayed here should correspond to amounts displayed on Form 4.

NOTE: DO NOT INCLUDE FUNDS RECEIVED VIA SPECIFIC LEGISLATIVE APPROPRIATIONS AS THEY ARE LISTED SEPARATELY ON LINE 44, LEGISLATIVE REQUEST FOR STATE FUNDS

Membership Dues - Individuals (Line 9)

Amounts received for personal memberships that procure directly for the member substantial private benefits, such as, the use of the organization's facilities and services, the right to receive directly useful publications, or the enjoyment of a professional standing or other honor.

This category is intended to include payments for bona fide membership benefits only. When benefits are not of a value reasonably related to the fee charged, the excess payment should be reported as "contributions."

Assessments and Dues - Local Member Units (Line 10)

Amounts received for membership payments from local member units that procure directly for such units substantial benefits from the parent organization.

Program Service Fees (Line 11)

Fee payments received for services furnished by the organization. Whether an organization uses schedules of fees for different services or merely requests clients to pay what they feel they can afford, any payments solicited or suggested or accepted as a contribution in return for an organization's professional services should be included here.

Sales of Supplies and Services to Local Member Units (Line 12)

Payments received for sale of supplies and services furnished by the organization to their local member units.

Sales to Public (Line 13)

Net revenues received (i.e. gross revenues minus related costs and expenses) from sales of publications and supplies to the general public.

Investment Income (Line 14)

Income earned from investments (securities, short-term investments of temporarily idle cash, real estate, etc.), including interest, dividends, rentals, royalties, and net earnings from activities, e.g., operation of an office building acquired through an endowment, conducted solely for the production of income.

Gain (Loss) on Investment Transactions (Line 15)

Realized gains and losses on investment transactions.

Miscellaneous Income (Line 16)

Revenue that cannot be classified elsewhere.

EXPENSES - Page 2

Salaries (Line 22)

Salaries and wages paid to the organization's regular employees (full or part-time) and to temporary employees, including "Office Temporaries," other than consultants and others engaged on an individual contract basis. Salaries are compensation paid periodically for managerial, administrative, professional, clerical and other supportive services. Wages are compensation paid periodically on a piecework, hourly, daily or weekly basis for manual labor, skilled, or a fixed sum for a certain amount of such labor.

Employee Benefits (Line 23)

Amounts paid and accrued by an organization under its own or other employee health and retirement benefit plans; including voluntary employee termination or retirement payments outside a formal plan.

Payroll Taxes, Etc. (Line 24)

Social security taxes, and compensation insurance premiums, payable by employers under federal, state or local laws.

Professional Fees (Line 25)

Fees and charges for professional practitioners, technical consultants, or semi-professional technicians, who are not employees of the organization and are engaged as independent contractors for specified services for a fee or other individual contract basis. However, amounts paid to mechanics, artisans, repairmen and others engaged in maintenance and repair services to an organization should not be included here but in "Occupancy" (Line 29); and fees paid for a client for direct personal services, other than those offered as part of the regular program services of an agency should not be included here but in "Specific Assistance to Individuals" (Line 34).

Supplies (Line 26)

Cost of materials, appliances and other supplies used by an agency.

Telephone (Line 27)

Cost of all telephone telegraph, mailgram, teleprocessing, and similar communication expenses.

Postage and Shipping (Line 28)

Cost of postage, parcel post, commercial trucking and other delivery expenses such as shipping and shipping materials incurred in the operation of the agency.

Occupancy (Line 29)

All costs arising from an organization's occupancy and use of owned or leased land buildings and offices, exclusive of costs reportable elsewhere. Examples include rent, parking rent, building insurance, mortgage interest, utilities, janitorial and other maintenance services, etc.

Rental and Maintenance of Equipment (Line 30)

Costs to the agency of rental and maintenance of various equipment, such as electronic data processing units, typewriters, calculators, etc., used by the organization in conducting its program.

Printing and Publications (Line 31)

Costs of printing, charges of commercial artists and suppliers for plates, artwork, proofs, photographs and other costs of house organs,, leaflets, films and other informational materials. Also included are costs of purchased publications, technical journals, books, pamphlets, and monographs.

Travel (Line 32)

Expenses for travel and transportation of staff and volunteers of the organization including bus and taxi fares, expenses for company vehicles, auto allowances, air fares, hotel, meals and incidental expenses, etc.

Conferences, Conventions, Meetings (Line 33)

Expenses of conducting or attending meetings related to an organization's activities including meeting space and equipment rental, meeting supplies, food and beverage costs, registration fees, etc.

Specific Assistance to Individuals (Line 34)

Cost of specific materials, appliances, services and any other assistance rendered by individuals or agencies other than the organization's staff, purchased at the expense of the agency, for a particular client or patient. Such expenses include medical and dental fees, homemaker services, food services, transportation services, etc.

Membership Dues (Line 35)

Expenses for bona fide memberships in other organizations which provide, in turn, benefits such as regular services, publications, materials, etc. Payments that do not procure for the paying organization general membership benefits should be reported in "Awards and Grants" (Line 36) or "Payments to Affiliated Organizations," as appropriate.

Awards and Grants (Line 36)

Amounts paid or committed to individuals or organizations for support of research, fellowship, scholarship, and other human service programs. Dues, quota payments and other formula based or prescribed payments should not be included here.

Miscellaneous (Line 37)

Expenses not reportable in other categories, such as, moving expenses, recruitment, bonding insurance, purchase of new equipment, etc.

Payments to Affiliated Organizations (Line 39)

Allocations to agencies by federated fund-raising organizations and for dues, quota payments and other formula-based payments by an organization to its affiliate(s).

A BILL FOR AN ACT

MAKING AN APPROPRIATION TO PROVIDE A GRANT-IN-AID TO THE
POLYNESIAN VOYAGING SOCIETY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. Findings and Purpose. The Legislature finds that there is a dire need to compile and preserve information about Hawaii's cultural heritage, particularly with respect to the long lost art of sailing great distances without the need for navigational instruments. The Polynesian Voyaging Society will again sail the Hokule'a to Tahiti in 1980, and the Legislature finds that such a voyage offers an opportunity to add to the store of knowledge about our past. The Legislature further finds that the Hokule'a voyage can serve as a means of obtaining and documenting authentic information about long-range navigation as practiced by the ancient Polynesian, and the dissemination in our schools of the knowledge gained from the voyage will enrich the education of our children.

It is the purpose of this Act to provide a grant-in-aid to the Polynesian Voyaging Society to enable it to conduct research, to document findings, and to disseminate information about ancient Polynesian navigation through educational activities in schools and in the community.

SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ _____, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to provide a grant-in-aid to the Polynesian Voyaging Society for

research, educational, and cultural activities associated with the documentation and dissemination of information about long-range navigation techniques and methodologies used by the ancient Polynesian.

SECTION 3. The sum appropriated by this Act shall be expended by the Department of Budget and Finance (BUF 881) for the purposes of this Act. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance of the appropriation made by this Act as of the close of business on June 30, 1981, shall lapse into the general fund.

SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect July 1, 1980.
