SUBJ : RESPONSE TO PVS ASSESSMENT SHEET (Dec. 14, 1978).

In response to questions 1 and 2, I think it would be most helpful if the "Minutes of Board Meetings" going back to April of this year are reviewed by all Board of Directors, especially those who have just come onboard. The Board, during the past year, has discussed 'goals and objectives' and it seems like this area should have been resolved by now. I highly recommend the reading of past minutes (going back to April 6, 1978), Nainoa Thompson's "Suggestions I Would Like To Consider As You Organize Another Voyage To Tahiti." (addressed to PVS Board of Directors, N.D.), Dr. Ben Young's proposal to the Board of Directors (July 6, 1978), and "The Final Report of the Education Committee, 1976-1977 (to the Trustees of the Kamehameha Schools/Bishop Estate)". All of the above would be instrumental for new Board members who are being asked to set priorities relative to your questions (1 & 2).

We have been waiting for Dr. Young to come up with his goals and objectives and so far we have been floundering. Both the Education and Canoe Committees have goals and objectives and these should be incorporated into overall PVS goals and objectives without delay. I also suggest that other committees submit reports (good or bad) at each monthly meeting.

In response to question 3, I do not feel that the monthly meetings accomplish all they should accomplish. Attendance has fluctuated in the past and responsibilities approved by the Board and then delegated to individuals has not been followed-up in instances. Suggestions/recommendations by Paige Barber should be reviewed. Where the Board has approved and empowered individuals to act as committee chairperson, project director, etc., the Board should realize that they have the final responsibility and should demand that monthly reports be presented to them monthly, as is done by the Education and Canoe Committees. I am amazed that the Board has let Dr. Young go so long without reporting back to the Board, and not just the President, on an area of responsibility so important. The Board has not heard from him since his proposal of July 6, 1978 was approved. How far has Dr. Young gone, who is on his committee, and what have they accomplished at this point without the Board's being informed?

In response to question 4, one primary responsibility without any doubt would be the attending of monthly Board meetings. If one cannot be present at X number of meetings consecutively, then there should be a means of replacing that individual from the Board with one who is willing to serve and attend meetings. Officers of the Board have their responsibilities more-or-less spelled out; others are given responsibilities by Mr. Tongg.

4. HO'I ANA I KE KAI (Return To The Sea)

A. Peter Apo oriented Education Committee members on the Ho'i Ana I Ke Kai project that he and Isabelle Hacskeylo are working on. He expressed interest and excitement in working with the Polynesian Voyaging Society and felt that using an eclectic approach would establish new avenues of enrichment on Polynesian voyaging activities. Peter expressed how intrigued ~~he has felt~~ with the accomplishments of the Education Committee.

B. Peter shared his mana'o on how they have worked in promoting <sup>this development of</sup> ~~a~~ marine curriculum based education for the young people of Hawaii. He discussed how the Waianae Project has institutionalized Polynesian voyaging in the schools (K-12) and how they have accomplished this feat by penetrating the system rather than working outside of it. He spoke of the importance of identifying goals, then developing an effective evaluation component allowing the achievement factor to become more measurable across the board when pursuing grant monies for further projects or extension and expansion of the present project.

Dear Sirs:

On November 7, 1978, the voters of Hawai'i voted on their Constitutional Amendments. One of the amendments to the constitution was to promote Hawaiian studies in the public school system.

Members of the Constitutional Convention realized that Hawaiian studies, long neglected, needed to be promoted in the schools. Their amendment was proposed and the public voted support of the amendment which will go into effect in 1980.

The Kamehameha Schools cover the standard curriculum of most American Schools but offer Hawaiian studies because students of Hawaiian ancestry attend the school. <sup>They have an extension program that serves other schools besides Kamehameha.</sup> Unfortunately, resource persons from Kamehameha Schools cannot reach all of the students on Hawai'i.

Therefore, we are very happy when institutions <sup>institutions</sup> are willing to implement Hawaiian Studies into the learning process. We especially endorse, the Polynesian Voyaging Society. The Society has a marvelous track record when it comes to research work and producing materials about Polynesian voyaging. They have undertaken enormous projects and have done a splendid job. And because of this, Kamehameha <sup>the</sup> Schools have <sup>been staunch</sup> supported their educational programs.

We strongly endorse their ethnic studies proposal.

THE BUILDING AND LAUNCHING OF HOKULE'A CREATED A RARE OPPORTUNITY FOR SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH INTO ANCIENT POLYNESIAN WAYS AND OCCASIONED A TRUE RENAISSANCE OF PACIFIC CULTURE. THE DRAMATIC CREATION AND EPIC VOYAGE OF HOKULE'A, IS AN ACCOMPLISHMENT OF GREAT MAGNITUDE AND LASTING EFFECT. WITHOUT THE ENORMOUS COOPERATION BY COUNTLESS INDIVIDUALS, HOKULE'A COULD NOT HAVE BEEN BUILT AND THE VOYAGE WOULD NOT HAVE BEEN POSSIBLE. THE CANOE ~~HOKULE'A~~ IS SERVING AS A FLOATING CLASSROOM TO BE VISITED AND EXPERIENCED BY EVERYONE INTERESTED. HOKULE'A WILL CONTINUE TO BE INSTRUMENTAL IN UNITING VARIOUS ISLANDS, RACES AND CULTURES.



Today's participation in the Ho'ike Hauli Celebration ran exactly to my prediction. It was a PVS one woman show! I was the only member there from 11:00 a.m. till 9:00 p.m.

I had temptations of closing our exhibit booth early and going home (there was a good movie on the trials and tribulations of a divorcee I wanted to watch on TV), however there were only two exhibit booths, ours and Eleu Canoe Club, and so I didn't have the heart of folding up my presentation materials and leaving them with just one exhibit for the whole festival.

At 6:30 they had their LANTERN PARADE with the Royal Hawaiian Band and the Aloha Week Court and other participating groups from the community. Unfortunately, they didn't do an effective job of publicizing the event and so instead of the 5,000 they were expecting, about a 100 spectators probably is closer to the number of the entire crowd for the day. It was disappointing to the PIC Council because they really expected a larger turn out.

I was only able to sell 3 tee shirts and 2 posters, amounting to \$16.00 in sales. I had to give the PIC Council 20% of our take, and that left us with \$12.80. Most of them could not afford to buy our NA PUKE HUAKA'I KAMALI'I books, even though their grandchildren asked for them and I reduced the price from \$10.00 to \$6.00.

I feel in any way that we can promote our Voyaging Society we should take the opportunity to do so. This way the public becomes aware that we are in operation and our GOAL is to be the FINEST CENTER ON POLYNESIAN VOYAGING. I also feel we should have more representation of members at these exhibits. Enthusiasm of our PVS members begets more community participation and recruitment of memberships.

Per packet handed out to everyone at the BOARD MEETING on Thursday evening, Kapua Lindo returned the packet as requested with red felt pen responses. Mahalo Kapua! Paige Barber returned the SERVICE BOARD VOLUNTEER INFORMATION SHEETS. She is the first member of our Service Board. Mahalo Paige!

2. Call Tim Lucas and ask him if he'd like to do session 4--Simplifying Polynesian navigation (Winds, currents, bird flights). I have a feeling that he has developed a lot in this area since he volunteered to do something. Melissa told me that he's a great teacher and I have great respect for her recommendations.
3. Call Dixon and ask him if he's really interested in participating in the workshop (He told me that he'd think of a topic to speak on). If he's not interested, even a wee bit, it's fine with me. Just want an answer so that I can get on with the planning.
4. If Dixon is not interested, call Abe Pi'ianai'a or Ruby Johnson of the UH. They can talk about the various settlers who colonized the Polynesian Archipelago. Tell them what our purpose is, and our target audience, please emphasize the importance of teaching techniques. (How teachers can use what they have to impart in their classrooms). *Only 1 person* *Visuals are also great!* *Audio-*
5. Ask Somsen if he's interested in participating (he said he was interested) and if he wants to participate, then what's his forte. Tell him to bear in mind that ~~his~~ materials have to be geared down to the elem., inter., high school levels.

Dear Ms. Lindo,

Thank you for your prompt reply to my request for current information on the Polynesian Voyaging Society's activities. The Education Committee that you head seems to be making great progress instilling cultural knowledge and pride in Hawaii's children.

I was very sorry to read about the Hokule'a mishap last month, and hope that all crew members were saved and that the canoe will be able to sail again soon. (News reports were sketchy in Colorado.) Will the accident change any of your committee's plans or activities?

As I mentioned in my letter, I need information on the Polynesian Voyaging Society so that I can prepare a proposal for a feature article on the awakening cultural consciousness of Hawaii's native inhabitants. I would not attempt to write an article with the sparse material I now have on file, but would come to Hawaii and research the subject personally.

I would be looking for positive elements for my story, and solid factual information on the actual Polynesian crafts and skills that are being revived (in addition to navigation skills). As a conscientious journalist, it is my habit to always double-check my information so that my articles are accurate and portray the subject in its true light; but this procedure does not include the subjects "previewing" an article for censorship.

If you would be so kind as to retain my name on your mailing list, I would like to learn more about the actual activities of the Hawaiiana movement. If you have any other material available that would shed light on exactly what traditional skills are being revived and taught by the PVS and other organizations (such as drying fish on racks, etc.), I would like very much to read it. Thank you.


