The meeting was called to order at 6:27 P.M. by President Michael A. Tongg. The agenda outlining topics to be discussed and other informational materials were distributed.

A quorum was not present. Consequently, the minutes will need ratification at the Board meeting held on August 3, 1978. At that time the Board can elect and approve all business done at the July 6, 1978 meeting.

I. APPROVAL OF MINUTES FOR JUNE 1, 1978

It was moved and seconded that the minutes be approved.  
The motion was carried.

II. TREASURER'S REPORT FROM ANTHONY GUERRERO, JR.

A. Guerrero was not present. M. Tongg clarified on the Statement of Income and Expenses indicating a balance of \$2,596.73 in the general fund and \$3,351.65 in the Children's Book Project.

Fisher Printing Company was paid \$500.00, and fortunately no interest will be paid on the existing balance of the bill.

It was moved and seconded that the Statement of Income and Expenses submitted by A. Guerrero be approved. The motion was carried.

III. CORRESPONDENCE REPORT FROM MARLENE AMONG, Administrative Secretary, Polynesian Voyaging Society

Membership renewal letters were written to the following:

An outline on the filing order and system of the Polynesian Voyaging Society office was distributed. This informs all Board members what information is in the files and where to obtain it when needed.

Willis Moore of Pacific Heritage will be showing the Voyage of Hokule'a on August 13, 1978 at 6:30 P.M. at Heritage Theatre at King's Alley.

IV. OLD BUSINESS

A. Education Committee - Cecilia Kapua Lindo, Chairperson

C. Lindo introduced Wailani Bell, Education Coordinator for the Polynesian Voyaging Society, and told members present that Gordon Pi'ianai'a issued W. Bell a check for \$100.00 to purchase stamps, etc.

The draft copy of the "Activity Book", Na Huaka'i or the Voyaging Works was distributed. C. Lindo indicated that all copies should be evaluated and sent back to the Polynesian Voyaging Society Office by July 14, 1978.

C. Lindo: The book is every teacher's dream and I had marvelous cooperation from all the committees.

I thought of dedicating the book to Eddie Aikau. He being on the canoe, and I wanted to know how the members felt about it.

J. Muller: I am sure it can be tastefully done. Good idea, but a little bit beyond that, and to those who never made it to include all the canoes that never returned.

C. Lindo: Do we have a consensus?

P. Barber: We so move to dedicate the book to Eddie Aikau and those in the past who lost their lives and never returned.

C. Lindo requested that M. Tongg bring his black and white photos of the Hokule'a into the office. They are needed for the "Activity Book".

It was moved and seconded that the Education Committee Report be approved. The motion was carried.

B. Canoe Committee Report - Wallace Froseith, Chairperson

W. Froseith was not present. M. Tongg indicated that the Hokule'a was ready to be launched but another vessel was in front of her.

IV. OLD BUSINESS (continued)

C. Alulike Positions

Paige Barber indicated that K. Froiseth called her for classification on filling the seaperson's positions. Since K. Froiseth was not present, it was not appropriate to discuss the positions any further.

D. Other

1. Polynesian Voyaging Society Goals and Objectives

M. Tongg referred to his memo on the clarification of goals and objections for the Polynesian Voyaging Society.

M. Tongg: First, we need clarification and understanding within the organization of our purpose and goals. Secondly, what are we doing in short and long term goals? From the written materials available to me - should we revise it because it reads more scientific and we have changed in our needs and wants. Are we looking to benefit Hawaii and its people or more for research purposes? We need to come up with recommendations in hopes to focus toward Hawaii's people not leaving out the intended ideas the original founders set out to do. Thirdly, it would be more practical from a financial point to orient things the Society could accomplish in immediate and short range objectives. Increased inter-island sails would be a lot more beneficial to Island people. With a decrease in the number of extended voyages and increase in island sails, many more people would have practical exposure. Such programs would allow for better implementation of immediate and short term objectives, as well as consistent with training and educational objectives.

I didn't contact Jann. I felt that a more practical aspect were things that we could accomplish in three to five year periods.

C. Lindo: I like some of these changes and recommendations - equally as well disseminate information so people can learn about these things. I like the way you have it geared to the people of Hawaii.

IV. OLD BUSINESS (continued)

D. Other (continued) (P.V.S. Goals and Objectives)

M. Tongg: What I need to know from you are what objectives and goals I have missed. I need your input.

A time frame was discussed regarding the goals and objectives of the Polynesian Voyaging Society. Some of the ideas were a. having a refurbishing phase, b. one to two year training phase, c. first year-cruises between the islands, second year - more time at sea, third year - extended voyages, d. Captain selection training two to three years, and e. training and experimental cruises along with educational workshops can be conducted during the periods Hokule'a cannot sail because of weather conditions.

M. Tongg: Ben Young has presented a list of suggestions of areas of responsibility for another voyage to Tahiti. (Memo attached)

B. Young: I like your objectives. It gives one a sense of time deadlines and seaworthiness and a look toward objectives and a built in process in developing a cadre of captains and ships officers.

Discussion took place regarding B. Young's memo clarifying the position of Project Director. On the previous voyage to Tahiti the role of Project Director was spelled out but not adequately and clearly defined.

M. Tongg: At times within the Steering Committee there were problems. It was rocky to make a decision for they lacked direction, had no adequate guidelines and policies as to who was to do what and even the Board. This spells out the area of responsibility of the Project Director in regards to his position to the Committee, Board, and Captains.

F. Lee: I like your plan and I think one difference we had before was communications between different people and crew. I like that because it sort of tries to bring back the communications we started before and improve it. This kind of communication is needed in defining and keeping people informed.

IV. OLD BUSINESS (continued)

D. Other (continued) (P.V.S. Goals and Objectives)

M. Tongg: The Board, Project Director, and Steering Committee has had a difficult time in communicating with the crew. We have our own contacts with individuals; yet it is important to both sides that we get along and work harmoniously with people not only in handling water situations. Communication is really the key point. The voyage this year was not successful, but we had a lot more ohana type spirit from crew and Board. That is why Ben came across with his memo in helping the crew in accomplishing our goals. The key point is communication and clarification right now.

P. Barber: We develop an organizational plan. I am pretty heavy on that. Otherwise, I see this proposal as being a two prong one - a development of a plan for the Polynesian Voyaging Society and defining more clearly the plans for a voyage. It bridges the two.

In fleshing in strength in communications and developing training competence relating to voyaging, I would like to see us initiate this as soon as possible.

M. Tongg: Just table these two items, think about it and talk to other members.

B. McGuire: Do you have a set criteria for a selection for a committee?

B. Young: Just a proposal. The next time the Board meets, a criteria for a competent person should be outlined for the planning committee to select the best people for the plan.

G. Pi'ianai'a: If the Board assumes such a role do the same members of the Steering committee exist?

B. Young: The present Steering Committee does not exist.

IV. OLD BUSINESS (continued)

D. Other (continued) (P.V.S. Goals and Objectives)

G. Pi'ianai'a: As far as the crew, we should make a decision as to where we stand on them. If the plan is accepted we start all over from scratch.

C. Lindo: Do we have enough?

B. Young: We will in two years.

G. Pi'ianai'a: Lay it on the line that we are starting all over again so the crew knows where they stand.

Motion made to accept M. Tongg's goals and objectives and Ben Young's proposal among the Board members. It was moved and seconded.

Motion on the floor to inform past crew members that it is the decision of the Board to start anew.

2. Polynesian Voyaging Society Personnel Rules, Policies and Procedures Manual

P. Barber amended that the manual read as Personnel Guidelines. She received no feedback from the members and asked for assistance in eliminating some of the verbage. It was agreed that present guidelines were too rigid, and perhaps it could be patterned after Alulike's guidelines and cut down to approximately five pages.

J. Muller informed the Board that Larry Johnson is leaving for the mainland and at the last membership meeting the Board did not take action to rescind L. Johnson as a Board member. It was moved and seconded to accept with regret the resignation of L. Johnson as a Board member, and the Board of the Polynesian Voyaging Society thanks him for all the work he has done. (A letter of thanks will follow.)

J. Muller: Since there is a vacancy now in the Board I make a motion to appoint Kaipo Kauka as a

J. Muller: (continued) Board member for the rest of the term. This is legal as stated in the By-laws, Article III, Section Five.

All in favor. Motion was carried.

B. McGuire was introduced. He informed the Board that he was asked specifically to come this evening to give his input to the Personnel Guidelines of the Polynesian Voyaging Society. The concern that he would have for the Polynesian Voyaging Society is do we want to become an employer as defined under Title III of the employment practices. His research library will be open to a representative from the Polynesian Voyaging Society, and recommends to the Board that they carefully study becoming an employer and he would be happy to assist us. He is also willing to put together a list of advantages and disadvantages in becoming an employer.

There was discussion regarding the \$25,000 grant and when will the Polynesian Voyaging Society receive it. M. Tongg will be looking into it further.

Also the question of amending our by-laws to include lifetime honorary memberships and automatic memberships to the media (radio and television) was brought up by J. Muller.

V. NEW BUSINESS

No new business.

VI. ANNOUNCEMENT

G. Pi'ianai'a: Francis and I were out at sea - 2nd day - bringing back Hokule'a.

The next Board meeting will be on August 3, 1978.

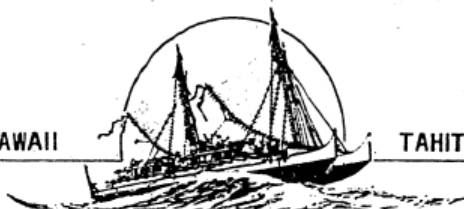

## PROBLEM AREAS:

1. Clarification and understanding of our purpose and goals.
2. Lack of objectives and tasks necessary to achieve the organizational goals.

## FACTS & BACKGROUND:

The Articles of Incorporation provide for the following purposes:

1. To sponsor, or conduct, or both, research on the manner in which Polynesian seafarers settled Hawaii and other Pacific Islands by investigating through experimental and other means the canoes, navigation systems and other technical and cultural factors that enabled the Polynesians to undertake successful voyages of discovery and settlement.
2. To disseminate the resultant research findings by producing or publishing, or both, articles in scientific journals, books, films and other instruments of communication in order to inform the public about Polynesian voyaging, and to make available data that might be useful to scientists and others engaged in maritime endeavors.

Nainoa Thompson, on November 4, 1976, submitted a lengthy list of goals and objectives which were later reduced to "8" objectives of the Polynesian Voyaging Society.

Since that time, no other studies have been done to determine whether or not our goals have become out-dated. After carefully reviewing whatever information<sup>1</sup> which was available to me, I have come up with several broad goals which would need approval by the membership.

Then, in order to accomplish these goals, the Board should set up immediate, short range, and long range objectives to accomplish our overall goals.

Just about all of the sources reviewed by this writer indicate that the purpose of the Polynesian Voyaging Society is toward the conducting of research and experimentation in all phases (means of travel--canoe; navigational systems; food; etc.) of Polynesian voyaging. In addition, said findings are directed toward educational purposes aimed at audiences ranging from children to scientific minds.

Since most of these studies were done over a year ago, there have been serious questions on the present goals and plans of the Polynesian Voyaging Society. Several questions which need to be answered are:

1. Is Hawaii and its people to be the primary beneficiaries of the Polynesian Voyaging Society? If so, shouldn't our activities and educational endeavors be geared toward Hawaii?

2. The present goal of the Polynesian Voyaging Society include research in the areas of long distance voyaging. Do we want to include inter-island voyaging as part of our goals.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

First, that the purpose clause of our organization be amended to provide for additional inter-island sailing. My reasons are as follows:

- a) Financially speaking, the preparation, time and cost for extended Polynesian voyages are extremely expensive.

b) Increased inter-island sails would be a lot more beneficial to Island people. With a decrease in the number of extended voyages and increase in island sails, many more people would have practical exposure.

c) Such programs would allow for better implementation of immediate and short term objectives, as well as consistent with training and educational objectives.

Second, that the purpose clause involving the dissemination of "resultant research findings" be amended to include the education of Hawaii's people. My reason for amending this paragraph would be to insure the welfare and education of Hawaii's people.

IMMEDIATE, SHORT RANGE AND LONG RANGE OBJECTIVES:

The long range objectives would be extended Polynesian voyages, which is, in fact, the main purpose for which the society was established. Research and educational material could be obtained from each voyage.

Short range and immediate range objectives could be established with inter-island sails, workshops and seminars.

It should also be noted that the objectives of the Education Committee could fit in well with this type of practical implementation plan. For instance, workshops and seminars could be placed in between voyages.

Lastly, the asthetic goals such as culture background, spirit, and friendship could be blended into immediate, short, and long range accomplishments.

Feb. 21--Met at Kamehameha School with Gordon Pi'ianai'a, co-chairperson of the Education Committee to incorporate the aims of the Education Committee for the year, 1979-80.

#### I. PLAN WORKSHOPS

  - b. In the 1st year, most of the \$20,000 that was granted was used to pay 2 crewpersons to take care of Hokule'a. A journey was made to test the traditional route, Kealaikahiki aboard the Hokule'a. Workshops were held on the neighbor islands~~X~~
  - c. Another grant of \$15,000 was awarded for the year 1978-79, to be used for the PVS to develop educational materials and cover office supplies, photos, posters, computer system for our master file, xeroxing, etc.
  - d. Gordon and I expressed concern about the job security for Marlene Among, Wailani Bell, Leon Sterling. We think it is imperative that they be employed so that we can function effectively as a society
    - (1) We talked about the possibility of funds(in case the award is granted) to cover 1 worker, perhaps temporarily

Within this time span it is inevitable to have developed strong feelings for our Polynesian Voyaging Ohana, and my own frame of reference about who we were, what we did, where we are, and in what direction we're heading. As some of you have already witnessed, I developed a souvenir handout for our OPEN HOUSE on Sept. 6th. It was done light-heartedly, because I wanted to let the members know what we (Alu Like Staffing) were doing without seeming too braggadocious. While it was meant to be entertaining, it was also meant to inspire you to attend the Board Meeting the following evening, filled with "NOTES FOR THE POLYNESIAN VOYAGING SOCIETY" AND "MEMOS TO GIVE TO THE EDUCATION COORDINATOR". Also filled with INNOVATIVE AND CREATIVE IDEAS....SUGGESTIONS....CONSTRUCTIVE COMMENTS....PROJECTS....notes for next meeting...1st THURSDAY of each month.

For those who weren't able to attend our OPEN HOUSE, I've enclosed a copy of my "light-hearted spoof" on two hula dancers with the aid of a Polynesian Viking and his crew, attempting to throw a grandiose OPEN HOUSE with a very limited budget to work with.

Since I ran off 100 copies (at my own expense), hoping that the whole State of Hawai'i would be attending our gala event, I can't bear to see 75 left over copies sitting on my shelf to feed the termites. So I've enclosed copies to everyone. It would absolutely delight me and put me in a state of euphoria if we have a 100% attendance at our Board Meeting, Thursday, and all of you show up with your packets that you've just received with lots of notes and memos to turn in to me marked with a bright red felt pen. Please surprise me and respond to anything I've written....I thrive on constructive comments....they give me the opportunity for growth and self improvement. Cecilia Kapua Lindo will be editing all of the formal correspondence I will be sending out.

#### ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING AND PLACE

As we all know, we have the options between the HYATT REGENCY or PRIMO GARDENS, and possibly THE WILLOWS. I would like to give my pros on why I feel the HYATT REGENCY would be effective.

My first reason is strictly emotional and non-rational.....Marlene Among is my very dear friend, I love her dearly and observed how much time and effort she put forth to getting the Ballroom for us free of charge. Besides being free, she was able to talk the President into giving us the pupu's at cost. Have you ever seen the pupu spread they put out? It's nothing to turn yours noses away from!

The following reasons are a little more rational:

- (1) It is convenient. Waikiki is closer for most people because of its central location. It is also easier to find, for members who aren't familiar with the Aiea area.

Marlene and I felt that as part of our membership drive campaign, we would write personal letters and make personal calls to our personal friends and acquaintances and try to invite them into joining our Society. Knowing our comradery, they would probably find an event at the Hyatt Regency more appealing than the Primo Gardens and therefore we might have an easier time of recruiting them as members.

I hope you all have 10 cons to counter-act my pros. I think open and honest discussions are healthy and everyone should say what they feel within reason. Wherever the Board decides is O.K! But lets decide so that Marlene can continue on with her plans. She has to confirm her reservations right away.

P.S. SUGGESTION: You can write your cons on the back of this sheet of paper in a bright red pen and bring it to the meeting Thursday...this may just be the "psychological trigger device" to get you there. Remember, we're voting on this issue. If you're not there, you don't get to vote!

# SERVICE BOARD CONCEPT

This is my brainchild. I borrowed the idea from the Bishop Museum. They have a SERVICE BOARD and it is quite effective. I am now a member of it and it's handled very professionally. I would like to try it out with our Society. Many of our members have the attitude that you have to be a Board Member to be actively involved with the Society. Many of these members, I'm sure, would probably like to become actively involved with the Society but don't know where to begin. If we sent the letter I've drafted out, after it's been approved and edited....we just might receive a response with it. We can at least attempt to have our members participate more with our Society. I have put together all the necessary paperwork....all I need is your approval on it. I have even volunteered to stay on if our positions terminate week after next, and organize and direct the activities of the SERVICE BOARD. Bear in mind though, that I am a single parent and sole bread winner as head of household. I have to split myself thin trying to be a dedicated mother, aspiring career woman, and TOTAL WOMAN. I won't have as much time as I do now to carry on as I would like to as the volunteer education coordinator-part time. In the past months, I have had the help and cooperation of the Canoe Supervisor and his seamen. Now that they are busy refurbishing the Hokule'a with the release of monies, I can't depend on them solely for help like I have in the past. We need a SERVICE BOARD!

# PROFESSIONAL EXHIBIT MATERIALS

With regret, I must admit that I was secretly relieved that the American Banker's Association canceled our requested exhibit at their Convention last week because their itinerary was filled. Carol Love, Convention Coordinator, called me in June to see if we would be interested in participating in the convention.

It was an informal request, because Carol Love is an associate of a long standing friend of mine, Josephine Flanders, who I use to dance hula for. We were just tossing the idea around since the Banker's had their last convention here when the idea of Hokule'a had just been born. Herb Kane gave a presentation to them, and they donated a large sum of money to her construction. Carol thought it would be nice to have the people hear about Hokule'a after she accomplished her successful voyages.

Let us take a realistic inventory of what professional exhibit materials we have on hand as a Society. In the past, different groups put together presentations using their own materials that they developed, but as these groups disbanded, the materials weren't all donated to the PVS. As a result we don't have that much of available materials to tap on as we should. I am in the process of developing different materials, but they cost money, and they take time to develop, because research has to be put into it, and the printing takes time.

For instance if I want to use different kinds of fishhooks in future exhibits....where do I get them from? In the past Leon Sterling has been using his on the presentations we have been giving, but they're his, he's fond of them, and he shouldn't be asked or expected to part with them. Where can I obtain fishhooks? Who can make them? Do we have the money to pay for them? This is just one example.

According to my own standards, a professional exhibit at the Sheraton Waikiki for the Banker's Convention would have needed the following:

- (1) film and slide projector
- (2) PROFESSIONAL BROCHURE depicting the background, accomplishments and needs of our Society  
Also showing the materials we have available for purchase
- (3) extra large, giant size, professionally done wall charts on voyaging.
- (4) miniature replica to scale of Hokule'a
- (5) artifacts used by the ancient Polynesians on their voyages
- (6) well planned advertisements for our products....  
books, tee shirts, posters, etc...
- (7) individuals to man the booths on a round robin bases for three days from 8:30 a.m. till 3:30 p.m.

We need volunteers to help with exhibits. Some of these items are now being developed by Marlene, Leon and myself. We still could use more volunteers though to help out. If staffing ends shortly, development of these materials will take longer.

#### FUNDING

We need money! Need I say more? We need grants, grants and more grants! We also need effective and successful fund raisers.

Marlene Among, our executive administrative secretary, has come up with her own brainchild. Due to her business association in the travel and airline business's in the past, she has taken 5 major companies in the islands and will test run her promotional campaign on raising monies for the refurbishing of the Hokule'a with them.

The following experimental companies are:

- (1) Dudley-Child's Inter-Island Resort
- (2) Calvin Lui's Hawaiian Adventures
- (3) Hiro-Kaminura Jet Hawai'i
- (4) Thomas Held Aloha Hawai'i Travel
- (5) Thomas Anderson Travel Arrangements

Marlene has done an inventory of items needed for the refurbishing of Hokule'a and has put an approximate price value on each item. She will give a list of these items to the different companies and let them choose which item they would like to purchase and donate to the PVS so that Hokule'a will once again get under sail. Their remuneration will be seeing Hokule'a sail once again bringing to the people of Hawai'i a better understanding of our Heritage. We will try to give publicity and public acknowledgements to these companies if possible. I will be assisting Marlene on this project if it is approved by the Board.

If this is successful then it will be developed on a larger scale. The next venture would be the fashion industry. For example, companies that might be tapped upon for support are:

- (1) Carol & Mary
- (2) Liberty House
- (3) McInerny
- (4) other kamaaina firms

For their donations their models may be photographed on the Hokule'a for their brochures.

Enclosed is Marlene's letter of introduction to these companies.

We are waiting for em!

#### ENTHUSIASM AND PARTICIPATION OF MEMBERS IN PVS SOCIETY

I leave this to everyone's own conscience. Our Board is made up primarily of many individuals who have professional jobs that are very demanding and absorb a great deal of their time. This is quite understandable. We should consider in this next election adding members on to the Board that have more time to give. Again, and not to be redundant, having an active SERVICE BOARD may be a catalyst for more enthusiasm and participation of members in our Society.



If you are still reading through my memos, you deserve to be congratulated if you are still with me on page 7. I hope you have given some thought to our meeting Thursday, and the future of our Polynesian Voyaging Society.

I hope to see you all there. Filled with positive thoughts and innovative ideas! Don't forget to bring your packets with you filled with comments in red ink.
