- TOHMY BOLLES — 4. Information gathered from experience about animals and plants, originally brought to Hawaii by Polynesians, AND OTHERS LIKE DR. BOLLES and carried this time on Hokule'a.
- DUKIE KUAKULU, — 5. Information gathered about star, sea, swell, and other sources used as navigational guides - and the sailing abilities of voyaging canoes like Hokule'a. The relationship of these things to theories about SHOOT BERTHEMANN, DAVID LEWIS, BEN PINNEY, ETC. Pacific migrations.
- DAVID LYMAN, — 6. Maps showing the course of the voyages to Tahiti and back to Hawaii. DAVID LEWIS, HOMER HAYES + HIS THEORY
- KEELI TAU-A — 7. Songs written about Hokule'a by different people.
