THE CREW MEMBERS OF THE HOKŪLE'A AND SUPPORTERS OF THE POLYNESIAN VOYAGING SOCIETY FOR THEIR
SUCCESSFUL AND UNIVERSALLY SIGNIFICANT VOYAGE OF REDISCOVERY.

WHEREAS, the Hōkūle'a, a 60-foot, double-hulled replica of an ancient Polynesian voyaging canoe, is returning to Hawai'i completing a successful two-year voyage; and

WHEREAS, the 1985-1987 voyage will have covered three times the distance of the two earlier voyages of 1976 and 1980 -- sailing to Tahiti, the Cook Islands, New Zealand, Tonga and Samoa; and

WHEREAS, the Hōkūle'a fostered goodwill throughout the Pacific and rekindled kinship among Polynesian peoples, utilizing three diverse crews that included representatives from each of the islands visited; and

WHEREAS, the Voyage of Rediscovery is a tribute to the Polynesian peoples' navigational skills utilizing the stars, currents and the position of the sun in relation to the canoe; and

WHEREAS, on May 23, 1987, there will be a celebration of Hōkūle'a's homecoming at Kualoa Park on O'ahu, culminating eleven years of scientific and cultural achievements; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Council of the City and County of Honolulu joins with the people of the State of Hawai'i in welcoming home Navigator Nainoa Thompson and crew members of the Hōkūle'a; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Council expresses its hope that such noble and valuable undertakings like the voyage of the Hōkūle'a be continued in the future; and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that the Council honors and expresses its pride for the accomplishments of the Hōkūle'a's crew members and the supporters of the Polynesian Voyaging Society in promoting goodwill throughout the Pacific and inspiring all of us to take on the spirit of challenge that generates exploration and discovery in every age.

Dear Pinky:

I am writing to share with you a copy of that portion of Senate Report 98-578, accompanying the Fiscal Year 1985 Appropriations Bill for the U.S. Department of the Interior, highlighting the committee's interest in having the Historic Preservation Fund establish a thematic review of maritime resources and recommend a set of priorities for the preservation of these, including expressly consideration of the Polynesian Voyaging Society's voyage of the Hokule'a.

Specifically, the report language states:

The Committee directs the Service, in consultation with maritime museums and the maritime preservation community, to (1) review the maritime resources of the Service and recommend the appropriate future role for the Service and for the private sector in preserving those resources; and to (2) conduct a thematic review of maritime resources and the appropriate Federal role in addressing those priorities. The Service should include activities such as the Polynesian Voyaging Society's voyage of the Hokule'a in their thematic review.

You may be assured that upon enactment of this bill into public law, I will contact the Administration regarding this particular initiative and keep you informed of what transpires.

HOUSE RESOLUTION

RECOGNIZING AND HONORING THE CREW MEMBERS OF THE HOKULE'A.

WHEREAS, the Hokule'a, a replica of an early Polynesian voyaging canoe, was built in recent times to demonstrate that ancient Polynesians could sail long distances of open ocean using their own navigational methods; and

WHEREAS, the 60-foot double hulled sailing canoe, named after a guiding star that helped the ancient Hawaiians, was launched in 1974 from Kualoa, Oahu; and

WHEREAS, in 1976 and again in 1980, Hokule'a voyages from Hawaii to Tahiti and back were successfully completed and served to spark a genetic memory of kinship among Polynesians both deep and moving to the Pacific spirit; and

WHEREAS, in 1985 the Hokule'a departed from Hawaii on an ambitious two-year "Voyage of Rediscovery" that will have included visits to Tahiti, the Cook Islands, Aotearoa, Tonga and Samoa; and

WHEREAS, when this voyage is completed, Hokule'a will have covered three times the distance of the earlier voyages, compressing a 1500-year voyaging history from a time when Polynesia was the largest nation on earth; and

WHEREAS, expert leadership and guidance for this historic voyage were lent by Master Navigator Mau Piailug, Navigator-Captain Nainoa Thompson and Captains Milton "Shorty" Bertelmann, Leon Sterling and Gordon Piianaia; and

WHEREAS, altogether a total of 56 individuals comprising 17-member crews over the last ten legs of this journey will have participated when Hokule'a returns to Hawaii; and

WHEREAS, the crew members have been unofficial goodwill ambassadors wherever the Hokule'a has put into port, greatly strengthening unity and understanding among Polynesian people; and

WHEREAS, crew members on the last leg of the Voyage of Rediscovery will include representatives from each Polynesian group visited by Hokule'a in the past two years, reconfirming a rich Polynesian commonality; and

WHEREAS, the Hokule'a and its crew have added to world knowledge of ocean currents, winds and sailing techniques, migratory patterns, navigation and culture, providing as well deep and endless artistic inspiration; and

WHEREAS, the Hokule'a will arrive at Kualoa in May 1987, the year of Ho'olako which celebrates the Hawaiian people and culture; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, that this honorable body hereby recognizes and honors all crew members of the Hokule'a as modern heroes and adventurers; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the Hokule'a crew members of the Voyage of Rediscovery and to the Director of the Polynesian Voyaging Society.

The Board of Directors of the Polynesian Voyaging Society submits this testimony in support of H.R. No. 400 and H.C.R. No. 237 requesting that the Governor and Mayors of the counties of Hawaii, Kauai, Honolulu and Maui proclaim the month of May 1987 as Hokule'a Month.

For more than ten years Hokule'a, Hawai'i's Bicentennial voyaging canoe has made outstanding contributions to our understanding and appreciation of the vast and impressive skills of our Polynesian ancestors through her fact-finding voyages to original homelands of Hawai'i's first inhabitants. Hokule'a has tested navigational and scientific theories believed to belong to the storehouse of knowledge created and used by ancient Polynesian voyagers and found these theories to be scientifically correct. Culturally, Hokule'a has reestablished ties with our Pacific Island cousins and these reunions bind our hearts and minds in celebrating the magnificent achievements of our common ancestors as well as the making of modern-day experts in ancient navigation techniques.

Nearly two years ago, Hokule'a left her homeland Hawai'i on the most ambitious undertaking to-date. She has sailed to those major island nations where it is believed Hawai'i's first people may have originated. Hokule'a and her crew and those who serve as resources have done an outstanding job in collecting primary information on science, culture and history. These findings will be published and made available to students young and old and will no doubt change formally held notions of ancient Polynesian migration and settlements.

Congratulating and commanding Pius "Mau" Pialug for his many achievements as a traditional navigator.

1 WHEREAS, Pius "Mau" Pialug of Satawal Island, Yap State, was working
2 as a fisherman in Hawaii in 1973, at which time he gave free fish to
3 hungry Micronesian students, including one who is now the Floor Leader
4 of this Congress; and

5 WHEREAS, at that time Pius "Mau" Pialug met some native Hawaiians
6 who wanted to sail a canoe from Hawaii to Tahiti using only traditional
7 navigational techniques and no modern navigational equipment to
8 demonstrate purposeful navigation and discovery by ancient Polynesians;
9 and

10 WHEREAS, Pius "Mau" Pialug served as the successful navigator of this
11 journey, which was made as a Hawaiian project for the United States
12 bicentennial celebration; and

13 WHEREAS, Pius "Mau" Pialug repeated this feat in 1980 with Nainoa
14 Thompson, an Hawaiian, as his apprentice; and

15 WHEREAS, Pius "Mau" Pialug has spent portions of the last 5 years
16 teaching Nainoa Thompson traditional Micronesian navigational techniques,
17 as applied to Polynesian locales, at the request of Thompson and the
18 Polynesian Voyaging Society; and

19 WHEREAS, Pius "Mau" Pialug is currently acting as an adviser and
20 on-board mentor and back-up navigator to Thompson on a 2-year voyage of
21 "rediscovery" to many Polynesian islands in the South Pacific; and

22 WHEREAS, Pius "Mau" Pialug's son-in-law, Thomas Reityman of Satawal,

1 has served as a crewman on this voyage; and

2 WHEREAS, Pius "Mau" Pialug, Nainoa Thompson, and Thomas Reityman

4 the Cook Islands, and plan to continue on to New Zealand, Samoa, and Fiji
5 before returning to Hawaii; and

6 WHEREAS, Pius "Mau" Pialug's accomplishments are a source of pride
7 for all Pacific islanders and enable all Pacific islanders to appreciate
8 and preserve an essential part of their heritage; and

9 WHEREAS, Pius "Mau" Pialug has served as a successful unofficial
10 "cultural ambassador" from the Federated States of Micronesia to Hawaii
11 and the rest of Polynesia; now, therefore,

12 BE IT RESOLVED by the Fourth Congress of the Federated States of
13 Micronesia, Second Regular Session, 1985, that the Congress hereby
14 congratulates and commends Pius "Mau" Pialug for his many achievements as
15 a traditional navigator; and

16 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this resolution be

20 Voyaging Society, Myron Thompson; Nainoa Thompson; and Thomas Reityman.



As you know, on Saturday, May 23, 1987, the Hokulea sailing canoe returned to Hawaii after a two-year voyage to the South Pacific. The Hokulea's return at Kualoa Park was greeted and cheered by thousands of our island's residents as well as representatives from the Pacific Islands visited by the canoe. RESOLUTION

RECOGNIZING THE HISTORICAL AND CULTURAL SIGNIFICANCE OF THE HŌKŪLE'A TO KUALOA PARK BY DESIGNATING THE SOUTH BEACH AREA AS "HŌKŪLE'A BEACH."

WHEREAS, first launched in 1974 on the southwest shores of Kualoa Park, the Hōkūle'a, a sixty-foot, double-hulled replica of an ancient Polynesian voyaging canoe, has returned to Kualoa and completed her two-year Voyage of Rediscovery; and

WHEREAS, as the place of origin and culmination of the Hōkūle'a's years of scientific, cultural and educational achievements, the south beach of Kualoa Park has a deep physical and spiritual relationship with the Hōkūle'a which has been established and nurtured by Hawaii's legends, history and culture; and

WHEREAS, legends recount Kualoa as the arrival site of the second migration to Hawaii from Tahiti in the 11th or 12th century and as one of Oahu's most sacred sites where vessels lowered their sails as they approached in honor and respect to the chiefs and priests gathered there; and

WHEREAS, the end of the Voyage of Rediscovery marks two years of travel throughout the Pacific during which migratory routes of ancient Polynesians were retraced, ties between and among the peoples of the Pacific were renewed, and high standards of human strength, self-sacrifice and commitment were relived; and

WHEREAS, the Hōkūle'a ends her ocean-going days as a cherished symbol of that which has effectively linked the rich, ancient Hawaiian cultural past to the present in terms of chants, dances, astronomy, navigation and seamanship; and

WHEREAS, as an ambitious, successful, historic endeavor, the Hōkūle'a will always serve as a tribute to the seafaring accomplishments of the Polynesian peoples and to the spirit and deeds of exploration, struggle, and survival which are a part of Hawaii's proud origins; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City and County of Honolulu that the historical and cultural significance of the Hōkūle'a to Kualoa Park be recognized by officially designating the south beach facing Kaneohe Bay from Kualoa Point to the end of the park boundary as "Hōkūle'a Beach" in commemoration of the Hōkūle'a's arrival at Kualoa on May 23, 1987, and the celebration of her homecoming; and

RESOLUTION

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the designation of the southwest shores, "Hōkūle'a Beach," be recognized by the Council and the City administration as a special pledge to continue the energy and spirit of the Hōkūle'a at Kualoa Park through educational programs and activities which demonstrate this commitment; and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the Mayor of the City and County of Honolulu, the Director of Parks and Recreation, the State Board on Geographic Names, the Polynesian Voyaging Society, the captains of each segment of the Voyage of Rediscovery, and Nainoa Thompson, the Hōkūle'a's navigator.

REQUESTING THAT THE GOVERNOR AND THE MAYORS OF HAWAII,
HONOLULU, KAUAI AND MAUI PROCLAIM THE MONTH OF MAY 1987 AS
HOKULE'A MONTH.

WHEREAS, Hokule'a, a double-hulled voyaging canoe was
launched in 1975 as Hawaii's contribution to the nation's
Bicentennial Celebration; and

WHEREAS, Hokule'a sailed successfully to and from Tahiti
in 1976 guided only by the stars and ocean currents; and

WHEREAS, that historical Pacific voyage was the first of
its kind in more than 500 years and hailed as one of the events
that generated the Hawaiian Renaissance; and

WHEREAS, the fact that Polynesians traveled throughout the
Pacific by design was finally established and the remarkable
feats of these ancient peoples were given due recognition
throughout the world; and

WHEREAS, for more than a decade thereafter Hokule'a
continued long distance voyaging between Hawaii and other
Pacific Islands; and

WHEREAS, to continue its search for new knowledge
Hokule'a again left Hawaii in 1985 to visit Pacific Island

settlers; and

WHEREAS, these Hokule'a voyages have expanded the body of
knowledge of the many aspects of Polynesian migration and
earned a place in history; and

WHEREAS, it is expected that the new knowledge and information gained from these recent Hokule'a voyages will enhance the existing body and understanding of Polynesian literature, navigation and culture by Pacific Island students both young and old; and

WHEREAS, a positive by-product of the Hokule'a voyages has been its ability to reestablish historical and cultural ties with our Pacific Island cousins and to promote a special relationship between the State of Hawaii and Polynesia; and

WHEREAS, Hokule'a once again embarked on a 1600-mile island-hopping "Voyage of Rediscovery" to Polynesia on July 10, 1985 from Miloli'i on the Big Island; and

WHEREAS, Hokule'a will complete its voyage in May, 1987 and formally land at the sacred site of Kualoa on Oahu where it first entered the ocean; and

WHEREAS, there will be celebrations to welcome Hokule'a home and acknowledging the contributions of those men and women who helped to make this important voyage a reality and a success; and

WHEREAS, these celebrations will be a special tribute to acknowledge the spirit of ho'olako during the 1987, Year of the Hawaiian; now, therefore,

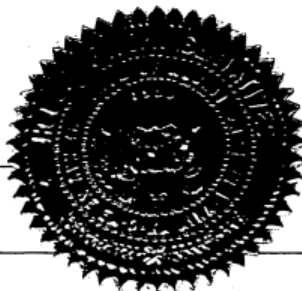

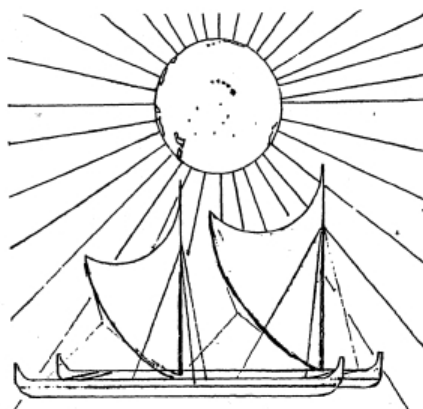
