Dear Mr. Chun:

You recently wrote to me concerning a discrepancy in your records in regard to the grant award to the Polynesian Voyaging Society for the fiscal year of 1985-86. There is also a discrepancy in our records concerning the grant award. We have a letter dated August 30, 1985, and another dated September 18, 1985; both refer to the award amount as \$1,500. However, Grant Agreement No. 000189 which was signed on November 12, 1985 sets the award at \$3,000.

The grant agreement states that the "grantee shall provide monetary compensation to Mr. Nainoa Thompson, a native Hawaiian, navigator of the vessel HOKULE'A, for his skills and services in directing the vessel throughout its voyages in the Pacific." My letter of April 2, 1986, speaks of the voyage from the Big Island to Tahiti, the Cook Islands, and New Zealand.

From New Zealand, the HOKULE'A sailed to Tonga; from Tonga to Samoa; from Samoa to the Cook Islands and back to Tahiti. In sailing east between Fiji and Tahiti via Samoa and the Cook Islands, Hokule'a has proven convincingly that east-bound voyages in the face of prevailing winds are possible. The voyage from Rarotonga to Papeete was very difficult. The Advertiser says that "It's a tribute to the skill, fortitude and determination of navigator, Nainoa Thompson, and Hokule'a's crew that the vessel arrived in Tahiti safe and sound."




VOYAGE OF REDISCOVERY

The HOKULE'A is now in Tautira, Tahiti. From there it will sail to the Tuamotu's and on to the Marquesas completing the journey on its last leg from the Marquesas to Hawaii. It is thought that the first migrations from the South Pacific came from the Marquesas to Hawaii. This will be the first voyage in modern time that follows this path.

The effects of the HOKULE'A's successful legs are like a geometric progression. They have added to the knowledge of ocean currents, the winds, sailing techniques. They have been a unifying force among Polynesians, as expressed by the welcomes received in diverse locations. They have produced educational activities, such as the newly opened program at the Bishop Museum and the Lawrence Hall of Science in California, television coverage, articles in magazines, newspapers, and scholarly journals. In fact these activities will continue after the Voyage of Rediscovery is completed.

On behalf of the Board of Directors and members of the Polynesian Voyaging Society, I would like to express appreciation for OHA's support of the Voyage of Rediscovery.

I would like to clarify a discrepancy in our records concerning the grant award to the Polynesian Voyaging Society (PVS) for the fiscal year of 1985-1986. Office records indicate that the OHA Culture and Education Committee awarded \$1,500 for PVS. A subsequent letter from the Office confirmed a \$1,500 award. However in a progress report (April 2, 1986), you mentioned (page 2, paragraph 1) that "a grant of \$3,000 had been approved."

It is our understanding that the award amount is \$1,500. However, if this is not your understanding of this award, I would like to know so and have this matter clarified. If you have any documentation to indicate otherwise, could you provide us with a copy?

The closing date of the grant agreement is October 31, the last day of this month. Our Office would appreciate receiving a final report (narrative) and an itemized budget (invoices and listing of payees) before the final payment of \$150.00 can be disbursed.



RE: POSSIBLE JOINT PROGRAM ON HAWAII COMMITTEE FOR THE HUMANITIES
GRANT PROJECT: "HAWAIIAN CANOE BUILDING: YESTERDAY, TODAY AND
TOMORROW."

In regards to this morning's telephone conversation, I would like to propose to the PVS the possibility of having a joint program which would utilize the media presentation developed by Tom Coffman under the HCH grant on "Hawaiian canoe building: yesterday, today and tomorrow." This media presentation has toured the neighbor islands accompanied by a lecture or panel discussion concerning various aspects of canoes. The program shown at Pu'uhonua o Honaunau was exceptionally well received when Dr. Ben Finney discussed the previous voyages and the most recent voyage of Hokule'a.

I would like to suggest to PVS the possibility of combining the above media presentation with perhaps a presentation on Hokule'a. I would like also to suggest a panel discussion on the current voyage of Hokule'a and perhaps some discussion on the return voyage to Hawaii, the plans for its welcome, and then the future. I think this would give the PVS an opportunity to reach a public forum beyond the media, especially if this program can reach our Hawaiian community.

The remainder of the grant's budget is approximately \$500.00 which must be expended no later than April 30, 1986. If the PVS is interested in such a joint program, I would be inclined to have the remainder of these funds given to the PVS for assistance in setting up the program and providing the panel.

As for publicity, if we are able to agree on a joint program, before the mid portion of this month, I can write up an article for our next (May issue) KA WAI OLA O OHA newspaper. Also, our Office would be able to send invitations to all the various Hawaiian organizations and so on.

Therefore, please let me know of what PVS would like to do in regards to this proposal. I am sure we may be able to work out the details as time passes by. However, the urgency is to know if PVS would like to consider doing this program.

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GRANT AGREEMENT

THIS GRANT AGREEMENT, made as of the ____ day of _____, 19__, by and between the OFFICE OF HAWAIIAN AFFAIRS, a body corporate, existing under the Constitution and the Laws of the State of Hawaii, hereinafter referred to as "GRANTOR" by its Administrator on behalf of the Board of Trustees, whose address is 567 South King Street, Suite 100, Honolulu, Hawaii 96813, and POLYNESIAN VOYAGING SOCIETY, hereinafter referred to as "GRANTEE", whose mailing address is P.O. Box 19000-A, Honolulu, Hawaii 96819;

WITNESSETH THAT:

WHEREAS, one of the purposes for which OHA has been established is to better the conditions of native Hawaiians as defined in Section 10-2(4), Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS); and

WHEREAS, the funds for this GRANT will come from the "public land trust proceeds" appropriated by the Board of Trustees for expenditure during fiscal year 1985-86 and is intended for the "betterment of conditions of native Hawaiians;" and

WHEREAS, eligible participants shall be native Hawaiians or legal dependents whose parent or guardian is a native Hawaiian; and

WHEREAS, OHA is authorized to enter into Agreements with any person, firm, association, or corporation as may be necessary in the conduct of its business pursuant to Sections 10-4(4) and 10-5(7), HRS; and

WHEREAS, one of the four major goals established by OHA is the "revival, enhancement, preservation, and perpetuation of the Hawaiian culture"; and

WHEREAS, GRANTEE represents that it has the required qualifications to perform the conditions required under this AGREEMENT;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of mutual promises hereinafter set forth, the parties agree as follows:

SECTION ONE

SCOPE OF GRANT AGREEMENT

1. GRANTEE, through its officers and agents, shall provide monetary compensation to Mr. Nainoa Thompson, a native Hawaiian, navigator of the vessel Hokule'a, for his skills and services in directing the vessel throughout its voyages in the Pacific.

SECTION TWO

PERSONNEL

The GRANTEE hereby agrees to the following personnel requirements:

1. The GRANTEE represents that it has, or will secure at its own expense, all personnel required in performing the conditions under this AGREEMENT. Such personnel shall not be employees of nor have any contractual relationship with OHA.
2. All of the conditions required hereunder will be performed by the GRANTEE or under its supervision, and all personnel engaged in the work shall be fully qualified and shall be authorized under State and local law to perform such conditions.
3. None of the work or conditions covered by this AGREEMENT shall be subcontracted.
4. The GRANTEE shall not assign any interest in this AGREEMENT, or shall not transfer any interest in the same (whether by assignment or novation).

SECTION THREE

TIME OF PERFORMANCE

The GRANTEE shall commence to perform the conditions of this GRANT on the 1st day of November, 1985, and the work described herein shall be completed and submitted not later than the 31st day of October, 1986 unless this AGREEMENT is sooner terminated as hereinafter provided.

SECTION FOUR

PERFORMANCE REQUIREMENTS

The GRANTEE shall comply with the following requirements during the term of this AGREEMENT:

1. The GRANTEE will be required at the completion of the grant period to submit a written report to Project Coordinator, Mr. William Tagupa. The written report shall include the GRANTEE's documentation of its overall effort towards meeting the requirements of this AGREEMENT in the manner contemplated.
2. In addition to the written progress reports, the GRANTEE, upon request, shall be required to meet with representatives of OHA to discuss the progress of the work hereunder. Should the

written reports fail to be filed with OHA on or before the required date, OHA is authorized to withhold funds owed to the GRANTEE until such time as such progress report is placed on file with OHA.

3. It is understood and agreed that the GRANTEE has the authority to control and direct the performance and details of the work and conditions herein contemplated; however, OHA retains the general right of inspection by a designated representative in order to judge whether, in OHA's opinion, such work is being performed by the GRANTEE in accordance with the terms of this AGREEMENT.

SECTION FIVE

COORDINATION

The work performed under this AGREEMENT shall be coordinated with Mr. William Tagupa of OHA who will act as the principal liaison between GRANTEE and OHA to assist OHA with OHA's general right of inspection and supervision to secure the satisfactory completion thereof. It shall be the responsibility of the GRANTEE to maintain close and frequent communication with OHA's project coordinator at all stages of the work.

SECTION SIX

GRANT AWARD

OHA will compensate GRANTEE as follows:

1. GRANTOR and GRANTEE agree that the total grant award under this GRANT shall not exceed THREE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$3,000.00), which sum is allocated for the purposes of this GRANT as set forth in the attached budget as EXHIBIT "A" which by this reference is made a part hereof.
2. All unexpended funds, on the completion of this AGREEMENT, shall be returned to OHA.
3. The GRANTEE shall be responsible for and pay all taxes--federal, state and local.
4. Allotments shall be made according to the classification of expenditures prescribed in the attached budget as approved by GRANTOR, and the funds allotted for each classification of

expenditure shall be used for no other classification of expenditure.

SECTION SEVEN

METHOD OF PAYMENT

1. OHA shall pay to GRANTEE an initial sum of ONE THOUSAND THREE HUNDRED FIFTY DOLLARS (\$1,350.00) against which GRANTEE shall bill the amount or amounts set forth in SECTION SIX. GRANTEE shall provide OHA with statements specifying in detail the number of hours expended, the task performed, the expenses incurred, and the balance remaining in the unexpended portion of the sum advanced. These statements, submitted by GRANTEE's office, shall be deemed as certification by GRANTEE that such work has been completed in conformance with the AGREEMENT.
2. Upon depletion of the initial sum, GRANTOR will pay to GRANTEE a second sum of ONE THOUSAND THREE HUNDRED FIFTY DOLLARS (\$1,350.00). As part of the request for the second sum, GRANTEE shall demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Administrator of OHA that the work under this GRANT has been performed in conformance with the GRANT and that the GRANTEE is entitled to receive the amount requisitioned. Any balance remaining upon the completion of the scope of the GRANT AGREEMENT shall be promptly returned to OHA.
3. It is further expressly understood and agreed that the sum of THREE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$300.00) shall be retained by OHA until final completion and acceptance of all conditions, evaluation, and reports to be performed under this AGREEMENT to insure full and satisfactory completion of this AGREEMENT.
4. The final payment shall be made in accordance with and subject to the conditions contained in Chapter 103-53, HRS.

SECTION EIGHT

MAXIMUM GRANT AWARD

OHA and GRANTEE agree that the maximum grant award by OHA to GRANTEE under the terms of this AGREEMENT shall not exceed THREE THOUSAND DOLLARS

(\$3,000.00), which sum is allocated from the public land trust proceeds, Chapter 10-13.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

SECTION NINE

RELATIONSHIP OF PARTIES

The parties intend that a grantor-grantee relationship will be created by this AGREEMENT. OHA is interested only in the results to be achieved, and the conduct and the control will lie solely with GRANTEE. GRANTEE is not to be considered an agent or employee of OHA for any purpose, and the employees of GRANTEE are not entitled to any of the benefits that OHA provides for OHA's employees. GRANTEE will be solely and entirely responsible for his acts and for the acts of his agents, employees, and servants during the performance of this AGREEMENT.

SECTION TEN

OHA'S RIGHT OF SUPERVISION AND INSPECTION

In the performance of the work herein contemplated, GRANTEE is an independent agent with the authority to control and direct the performance of the details of the work, OHA being interested only in the results obtained. However, the work contemplated herein must meet the approval of OHA and shall be subject to OHA's general right of inspection and supervision to secure the satisfactory completion thereof.

SECTION ELEVEN

DISPUTES

All disputes arising under or related to this AGREEMENT shall be resolved in accordance with this clause.

1. Any claim arising out of this AGREEMENT shall be made in writing and submitted to the Administrator, OHA.
2. The Administrator shall make findings of fact and render a decision within twenty (20) days of the request, provided all the necessary investigations can be made. The finding and decision shall be written and shall be mailed or otherwise furnished to GRANTEE.

3. If the Administrator cannot decide the claim within twenty (20) days, he shall notify the GRANTEE when the decision shall be made. The Administrator's decision shall be final.

SECTION TWELVE

CHANGES IN PROJECT SCOPE

Notwithstanding any other provision of this AGREEMENT, neither OHA nor GRANTEE shall change the scope of the GRANT AGREEMENT without first entering into a written agreement which sets forth the nature of the change and adjusts the amount of the grant accordingly.

SECTION THIRTEEN

WARRANTIES

The GRANTEE warrants the following during the terms of this AGREEMENT:

1. That on the effective date of this AGREEMENT, GRANTEE is in good standing and is a validly subsisting non-profit membership corporation under the State of Hawaii and the Internal Revenue Service.
2. That this AGREEMENT is entered into pursuant to and with the authority of its Board of Directors and that the signatories to this AGREEMENT are authorized representatives of GRANTEE empowered to execute this AGREEMENT on its behalf.
3. That during the period of this AGREEMENT they will comply with federal, state, and county laws governing or regulating the activity performed, as well as the standards promulgated by OHA governing the award of grants, attached hereto as EXHIBIT "B".

SECTION FOURTEEN

INDEMNIFICATION

The GRANTEE shall indemnify and hold harmless OHA, its officers, agents, representatives and assigns, from any and all claims, suits, actions, damages or costs of every nature and kind which may be brought for or on account of any errors, omissions or negligent acts of the GRANTEE, its officers, agents, servants or employees in the performance of this AGREEMENT.

SECTION FIFTEEN

COMPLIANCE WITH STATE, FEDERAL AND/OR LOCAL LAWS AND RULES

GRANTEE agrees to comply with all federal, state, and county laws, rules and regulations that are now or may in the future become applicable to GRANTEE or GRANTEE's business, equipment, and personnel engaged in operations covered by this AGREEMENT or occurring out of the performance of such operations.

SECTION SIXTEEN

TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT FOR CAUSE

If, through any cause within its control, the GRANTEE fails to fulfill in a timely and professional manner its obligations under this AGREEMENT, or if the GRANTEE violates any of the covenants, terms, or stipulations of this AGREEMENT and does not cure such failure within a period of fifteen (15) days after receipt of notice from OHA specifying such failure, OHA shall thereupon have the right to terminate this AGREEMENT by giving written notice to the GRANTEE of such termination and specifying the effective date of such termination. In that event, all finished or unfinished documents, as required by SECTION FOUR, and prepared by the GRANTEE shall, at the option of OHA, become its property, provided that no termination costs shall be allowed to the GRANTEE in such an event.

SECTION SEVENTEEN

TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT FOR CONVENIENCE

OHA may terminate this AGREEMENT for convenience at any time by giving the GRANTEE fifteen (15) days written notice of its intent. In that event, all finished or unfinished documents and other materials described in SECTION FOUR shall, at the option of OHA, become its property. Within sixty (60) days after termination, GRANTEE shall submit a claim certified as to accuracy which will specify in detail all costs incurred in performance of conditions under this AGREEMENT. The parties shall then negotiate an equitable adjustment, including profit, based upon the percentage of contract completion. In no event may the agreed amount exceed the total value of this AGREEMENT.

SECTION EIGHTEEN

STRICT PERFORMANCE

The parties, by this AGREEMENT, recognize that OHA has a right to insist upon strict performance by the GRANTEE. Any failure by OHA to insist upon strict performance of any provisions of this AGREEMENT, or to exercise any right based upon a breach thereof, or the acceptance of any performance during such breach, shall not constitute a waiver of any rights of OHA under this AGREEMENT. Furthermore, no waiver granted by OHA on account of any violation of any covenant, term or condition of this AGREEMENT shall constitute or be construed in any manner as a waiver of the covenant, term or condition, or the right to enforce the same as to any other or further violation.

SECTION NINETEEN

OWNERSHIP OF MATERIAL PREPARED PURSUANT TO AGREEMENT

Copies of furnished material, as required by SECTION FOUR, prepared by the GRANTEE under this AGREEMENT shall be clearly identified as being associated with OHA and shall be submitted to OHA for review and comments prior to any final draft. All such material prepared under this AGREEMENT shall become the property of OHA at the completion of the term of the AGREEMENT.

SECTION TWENTY

NOTICE

Any and all notices or other communications required or permitted by this AGREEMENT or by law to be served on or given to either party hereto, by the other party hereto shall be in writing and shall be deemed duly served and given when personally delivered to the party to whom it is directed, or in lieu of such personal service, when deposited in the United States mail, postage prepaid, addressed to the principal place of business of the party to receive the Notice first above written or at such other place as either party hereto may from time to time designate in writing.

SECTION TWENTY-ONE

ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This AGREEMENT contains the entire undertaking of the parties and supersedes all previous verbal and written agreements; there are no other agreements, representatives or warranties not set forth herein.

SECTION TWENTY-TWO

GOVERNING LAW

This AGREEMENT shall be governed by and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Hawaii.

WHEREAS, Polynesians have been called "The Vikings of the Pacific" in recognition of their extraordinary navigational skills, feats of discovery, and settlement of islands separated by more than 6,000 miles of open ocean; and,

'OIAI, ua kapa 'ia nā po'e Polenekia 'Nā Viking o ka Pakipika", no ko lākou mau hana no'eau ho'okele wa'a kupaianaha, nā hana hō'imi 'āina a me ka ho'okahua 'ana o nā pae 'āina i ho'oka'aweale 'ia me ka moana nui i 'oi aku o 'eono kaukani mile; a,

WHEREAS, these skills were once feared lost and beyond recapture; and,

'OIAI, mana'o 'ia kēia mau hana noe'au, ua nalowale nō a 'a'ole nō e hiki ke loa'a hou; a,

WHEREAS, the Polynesians Voyaging Society (PVS) was formed in 1974, with the express purpose of building a canoe dedicated to the rediscovery and affirmation of ancient Hawaiian celestial navigation and achievement; and,

'OIAI, ua ho'omaka 'ia ka Polynesian Voyaging Society i ka makahiki 'umikumamāiwakanahikukumamāhā, me ke kumuhana ho'olahalaha o ke kalai wa'a e pa'a ka mana'o i ka hō'imi 'āina hou a me ka hō'ae 'ana o ka hana kilolani ho'okele wa'a kahiko a kū i ka ni'o; a

WHEREAS, this purpose could and would only be fulfilled because of the personal dedication and courage of Nāinoa Thompson to the pursuit and acquisition of such knowledge from both traditional lore and modern astronomy; and,

'OIAI, ua hiki a pa'a kēia kumuhana no ka iho pa'a a wiwo 'ole no Nāinoa Thompson i hahai a loa'a kēia mana'o ma nā mo'olelo kupuna a ka hana kilolani o kēia mau lā; a,

WHEREAS, Nāinoa Thompson demonstrated this renewed tradition of Hawaiian navigation by sailing the double-hulled canoe Hokule'a -- named for a guiding star which helped lead ancient Polynesians over the endless miles of open ocean to Hawai'i -- on a two-year "Voyage of Rediscovery" which echoed the routes of generations from the Marqueses and Tahiti, from Samoa and the Cook Islands, from Rarotonga to the Maori Kingdoms; and,

WHEREAS, the completion of this Voyage coincides with Ho'olako, the year of celebrating the enriching reunion of the old and new triumphs of the Hawaiian people and culture; and now,

'OIAI, ua piha pono kēia Huaka'i me Ho'olako, Ka makahiki i ho'okahakaha 'ia a 'O'ili pulelo nā hana kahikio a hou a nā po'e kākā a ko lākou 'ike; a laila,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of OHA wishes to acknowledge the achievements of Nāinoa Thompson as an outstanding Hawaiian.

NO LAILA, makemake nui ka Papa Kahu Waiwai o ka Office of Hawaiian Affairs e ho'ohanohano i nā hana a Nāinoa Thompson, he kanaka ha'aheo a ka lāhui Hawai'i.


