VOYAGE OF REDISCOVERY

MISSION STATEMENT

To share Hokule'a's accomplishments during the VOYAGE OF REDISCOVERY through a statewide educational sailing program using Hokule'a as a floating classroom and to extend appreciation to the people of Hawaii for their support and aloha.

GOALS

- 1) To sail Hokule'a to the islands of Lanai, Hawaii, Maui, Molokai, Niihau, Kauai from Oahu in order to share the experience of Hokule'a's VOYAGE OF REDISCOVERY and to execute community-based educational programs to promote island-wide support.
- 2) To engage the public and private educational systems in Hawaii in the planning and implementation of island-wide activities and to foster partnerships for the development and distribution of educational, scientific and cultural materials.
- 3) To engage the broader community in supporting the educational, scientific and cultural missions of the Polynesian Voyaging Society through membership and planned activities.

TASKS:

- 1) Utilize the DOE school districts and Kamehameha Schools Regional Centers in implementing the around the state sail.
 - a) Distribute the educational materials (video tapes/reading materials) to the resource centers/DOE to facilitate the educational process. This allows them to brief their audience before the hands-on experience on-board Hokule'a.
 - b) The educational materials will consist of a 20 minute video tape presentation, Honolulu Magazine insert, list of PVS resource materials, (where they updated brochure.
 - c) To conduct a state-wide teacher workshop on Oahu when Hokule'a returns
 - d) To conduct half-day sails for PVS supporters, when Hokule'a returns to Oahu
- 2) To make Hokule'a self-contained so that PVS will have the ability to give presentations on-board Hokule'a.
- 3) To combine the canoe and crew selection committee with the suggested members: Pinky, Nainoa, Wally, Billy, Gil and selected captains.

REVISED SAIL PLAN

August 20, 1987

The committee recommends to the Board of Directors that the sail plan be revised to include Niihau and Kauai as the first island stops and to defer the sail to the remaining islands until March 1988 for the following reasons:

- a) To take advantage of the good sailing weather in getting Hokule'a to Kauai and Niihau in September.
- b) To have Hokule'a back on Oahu by September 25th, so that Hokule'a and crew members can participate in the Ellison Onizuka Science Legacy program at Kuilioloa Heiau at Pokai Bay.
- c) To give the Education Committee adequate time to launch an effective educational program plan.
- d) To give the committee adequate time to raise the funds for the sail.

SPEECH PREPARED FOR DAN AKAKA -- PAPEETE, TAHITI

MR. MAYOR, DISTINGUISHED GUESTS, ALOHA, ALOHA PUMEHANA KAKOU. A VERY WARM GREETING FROM ALL OF US TO ALL OF YOU. I BRING GREETINGS FROM THE PEOPLE OF THE UNITED STATES AND, IN PARTICULAR, THE PEOPLE OF HAWAII.

I COME OVERFLOWING WITH APPRECIATION FOR THE BEAUTIFUL MANNER IN WHICH YOU HAVE RECEIVED OUR CANOE, HOKULE'A, AND OUR CREWS. YOU HAVE BEEN MOST GENEROUS AND YOU HAVE CARED FOR US WELL. MAURURU. MAURURU

TODAY YOU HAVE PRODUCED THIS MAGNIFICENT "MARAE". NEARLY TWO YEARS AGO, WHEN HOKULE'A ARRIVED FOR THE THIRD TIME, YOU TOLD US YOU WOULD BUILD THIS MARAE. YOU HAD A SKETCH THEN. YOU TOLD US THAT YOU WANTED TO NAME THIS BEACH IN HONOR OF HOKULE'A. YOU HAVE DONE WHAT YOU SAID YOU WOULD DO.

AND SO TODAY, AS YOU PROPOSED NEARLY TWO YEARS AGO, WE WILL PLACE OUR KO'ULA ROCK WHICH WE BROUGHT TWO YEARS AGO HERE UPON THIS BEAUTIFUL MARAE. THIS KO'ULA ROCK IS A REMEMBRANCE OF OUR CREWS' COURAGE, STRENGTH AND PRIDE IN THEIR EFFORTS TO FIND OUT MORE ABOUT THEIR ANCESTRAL BEGINNINGS. IT IS ALSO A SYMBOL OF THE STRENGTH, COURAGE AND PRIDE OF OUR ANCESTORS' MANA, AS THEY DELIBERATELY SAILED AND FOUND THEIR NEW HOMES IN TAHITI AND ALL OF POLYNESIA, "THE LARGEST NATION ON EARTH" IS HOW CAPT. JAMES COOK DESCRIBED IT IN 1778.

THE STRONG SUPPORT OF ALL OF FRENCH POLYNESIA OVER THE PAST ELEVEN YEARS HAS ^{helped} ~~enabled~~ THE CREWS AND HOKULE'A TO SUCCESSFULLY RETRACE THE PATHS OF OUR ANCESTORS. THIS "VOYAGE OF REDISCOVERY" IS PROVING THAT OUR ANCESTORS, AS LEGENDS TELL US, AND SOME SCIENTISTS HAVE SUGGESTED, COULD HAVE SAILED LONG DISTANCES. HOKULE'A HAS TRAVELLED 13,000 MILES SO FAR: FROM HAWAII TO TAHITI TO NEW ZEALAND AND HAS RETURNED TO TAHITI.

THIS "VOYAGE OF REDISCOVERY" IS PROVING THAT OUR ANCESTORS COULD HAVE SAILED WITH NAVIGATORS, AS OUR PRESENT POLYNESIAN, NAINOA, IS NAVIGATING, WITH ONLY THE USE OF HIS EYES, EARS, MOUTH, FEELINGS OF HIS SKIN, FEELINGS OF HIS BODY, AND TREMENDOUS USE OF HIS MEMORY AS HE REACTS TO THE OCEAN, THE SKIES, THE WINDS, THE STARS, THE SUN, THE MOON, THE ANIMALS IN THE OCEAN AND THE BIRDS IN THE SKY, TO FIND HIS WAY.

THE "VOYAGE OF REDISCOVERY" IS PROVING THAT OUR ANCESTORS COULD HAVE, COULD HAVE EASILY SAILED THE IMPOSSIBLE ROUTE, AS STATED BY SOME SCIENTISTS AND WRITERS, THE IMPOSSIBLE ROUTE FROM WEST TO EAST, SAILING INTO THE PREVAILING WIND. WE ARE HERE. WE HAVE COME FROM SAMOA TO THE COOK ISLANDS TO PAPEETE.

SO, YOU AND WE, THROUGH THE VOYAGES OF THE HAWAI'IKI NUI AND THE HOKULE'A HAVE REDISCOVERED THAT WE ALL COME FROM A PROUD SEAFARING HERITAGE.

TODAY, AS WE PREPARE FOR OUR "PROUD VOYAGE HOME" WE JOIN OUR KO'ULA ROCK WITH YOUR MARAE TO AGAIN MAKE CLEAR TO THE WORLD THAT WE ARE BOUND TOGETHER AS POLYNESIANS, THAT OUR COMBINED ANCESTRAL AND PRESENT DAY MANA WILL HELP ALL OF US, OUR CHILDREN AND GRANDCHILDREN AND GENERATIONS TO COME, TO NAVIGATE THEIR LIVES SUCCESSFULLY.

AND SO, AS I CALL FOR THE HOKULE'A CREW TO COME FORTH AND AS WE CALL UPON TANGAROA, I CALL FOR OUR BLESSING.

PROPOSAL FOR A COMMEMORATIVE MARKER AT KUALOA PARK

Kualoa is a significant location on O'ahu for both ancient and modern history. Legends recount that the second migrations of Polynesians, coming from Tahiti, landed at Kualoa in the 11th or 12th centuries. Within the past twelve years, the modern replica of a Polynesian voyaging canoe, HOKULE'A was launched from Kualoa Beach Park. Having sailed the ancient Pacific migration routes, the modern canoe will return to Kualoa in May of 1987, making Hokule'a a symbolic link between ancient and modern history. This is a proposal to commemorate the past and the present by placing a historical marker at Kualoa Beach Park.

SIGNIFICANCE OF THE AHUPUA'A OF KUALOA

Kualoa is one of the most sacred places on O'ahu. Why Kualoa was deemed sacred by the ancient Hawaiians is not documented; that it was sacred is very generally accepted. It was a land section that was always kept kapu for the ruling chief.

Unlike the typical pu'uhonua (places of refuge) of Hawai'i, which were delineated by stone walls and were seldom much larger than an average heiau, the entire ahupua'a of Kualoa was considered a place of refuge.

Infant children of ali'i were taken to Kualoa to be reared and to receive proper training in warfare and the ancient traditions.

Many references are made to the fact that the sails on all canoes passing Kualoa were lowered in deference to the chiefs and priests gathered there.

Sacrificial victims for heiau ceremonies were drowned in the waters off Kualoa.

The sacredness of the area is referred to in many descriptions and specific place names:

1. The sacred drums of Kapahu'ula (red drum) and Wa-'ahu-'ula-punawai (or Ka-'ahu-'ula-punawai--the spring of the feather cloak) which were at Kualoa.
2. The sacred hill of Kaua-kahi-a-ka-ho'owaha (the single battle of the despised).
3. Kualoa's summit ridge is Mo'o-kapu-o-Haloa (the sacred ridge of Haloa). Haloa was the son of Wakea, the first man.
4. Kanehoalani (the royal friend of the god Kane) is the highest peak in the area.

At one time there were five fish ponds at Kualoa. All were constructed pre-contact. The area was significantly important as a source of sea food. Moli'i Pond is still worked and has always been one of the most valuable along Kaneohe Bay. It was constructed in the 1200's.

In ancient Hawai'i only the ruling ali'i could possess whale ivory (palaoa). Whales were never actively hunted, but ocean currents often washed injured or weak/aging whales to the Kualoa shores. This area is known as one of the best sources of whale ivory in the islands--an indication of the important "wealth" of the area.

Archeological finds over the last 15 years have been significant in quantity, quality, and variety--all substantiating the cultural importance of Kualoa.

Kualoa was a significant area for growing wauke, used for making kapa.

MacAllister, in his Archeology of O'ahu records the claim that breadfruit was introduced to Hawai'i at Kualoa.

SIGNIFICANCE OF THE SITE TO HOKULE'A

Herb Kane wrote in "A Canoe Helps Hawaii Recapture Her Past" that the HOKULE'A was built at the Dillingham Shipyard in Honolulu, then the completed parts were trucked across O'ahu to the beach at Kualoa--a place so sacred that canoes lowered their sails as they passed.

"Volunteers came to lash the canoe together with five miles of rope. Finally--nine months after her design began, she was ready to take to the water.

On March 8, 1975, the beach at Kualoa rang with chants and ceremonies dating from Hawaii's earliest years. The chanter Kaupena Wong officiated that day as HOKULE'A at last took to her element.

A thousand spectators watched men take hold of hauling lines. Paddlers stationed themselves at the cross booms connecting the two hulls. Kaupena began the traditional launching shout, and the canoe moved forward. Her bows came down over the crest of the beach, and with a thunderous rumble, HOKULE'A plunged into Kaneohe Bay."

In May of 1987, Kualoa will again be the site of a traditional ceremony led by Kaupena Wong. This will be the traditional welcome for the return of the HOKULE'A from its two year Voyage of Rediscovery.

SIGNIFICANCE OF THE VOYAGES OF THE HOKULE'A

Polynesian navigation was "an enterprise that properly should be ranked among the great human achievements of human history, and one that must have been flooded with human drama. The lack of nautical instruments makes the successful voyages all the more

remarkable, for the navigational problems were solved with the naked eye and the exercise of human judgment" (Mitchell, Donald. Resource Units in Hawaiian Culture, p. 165).

The voyages of the HOKULE'A have a place in history. The 1976 voyage was hailed as one of the events that opened the Hawaiian Renaissance. In 1980, the HOKULE'A was navigated by the first Polynesian since ancient times to navigate a voyage without instruments. Combined with archaeological evidence, the 1985-87 voyage has proven convincingly that migrants from Asia island-hopped their way across the Pacific to settle "the largest nation on earth" by 900 AD.

The voyages have added to the knowledge of ocean currents, winds, and sailing techniques. They have discredited the theory that ancient Polynesian voyages were accidental. They have been a unifying force among Polynesians, as expressed by the welcomes the HOKULE'A received in diverse locations. They have linked modern and ancient history.

A monument to commemorate these accomplishments, to remember the ancient culture, is important, not just for the present, while the voyages of the HOKULE'A are in the public eye, but for the future.

SUGGESTED PROJECT DESIGN

1. The city of Honolulu will pay for materials and for setting the monument in the park.
2. Businesses and Corporations will be asked to donate money for a cash award to the artist who designs and completes the monument.

3. A committee will be formed by the City Council to set up the criteria for the monument (cost and size limitations, etc.), to solicit designs from artists, to select the winning design. Committee members should include:



Dear Friends. . . Aloha,

I have volunteered to organize the traditional welcome ceremony for the return of Hokule'a to Hawaii in May of this year.

My letter to you is to ask if you will participate as a composer, chanter or kokua for this historical, cultural event.

At this writing the organization of the ceremony is in its second-draft and includes:

- 1) Ho'okipa
- 2) Ho'omaika'i
- 3) Ho'ola'a
- 4) Ho'okupu

I would like to use traditional chants for items #1,2, and 3 (although I have in mind to add to the traditional in #1 two new mele kahea.) Participants (except for female crew members) will be male chanters and kokua.

It is my hope that item #4 (ho'okupu) will consist entirely of "gifts-of-the voice", mele, performed by eight female chanters and, perhaps, in a variety of chanting styles. The number of chanters we use will be determined by the number of newly composed mele we receive. I am confident we will get our eight plus chants. We have yet to identify existing chants or songs relating to the Hokule'a project, that might be chanted too.

May I offer some general suggestions about the mele compositions: five verses of four lines each verse; topics; all aspects of the Hokule'a experience -- the canoe, individuals, voyage etc. or mele pana, aloha 'aina here or other Polynesian groups and dedicated to (inoa) Hokule'a and/or to individuals or to the Polynesian Voyaging Society. The performance of the chant would be oli style (solo) even though the composer might eventually want the mele to be a hula. For whatever its worth, I have used mele hula for mele oli.
