Subject: 1988 Summer Sail

Hokule'a will be participating in the around-the-State education program from June 16 to July 26. We will be sailing to all the major islands and we will be making separate island stops. Kamehameha Schools is contracting with P.V.S. for this project. Included in the budget is money for some compensation for some crew members. This will be determined according to need, workload and time commitment.

Students from the D.O.E. Summer School program will be visiting the canoe at each stop. We expect 4,000 youngsters to come on board when in port.

We will need crews on each of these legs. With the responsibility of captain and crew members to:

- 1) safely deliver the canoe to each scheduled port--weather permitting.
- 2) present Hokule'a to the school children at each port by:
 - a. showing them the canoe.
 - b. talking about Polynesian seafaring.
 - c. being responsible for their safety and welfare while visiting the canoe.
- 3) clean, maintain and guard the canoe while it is in port.

I
am writing to you to let you know about this project. If you want to sail, call me @ [REDACTED] or write me @ [REDACTED] Honolulu, HI 96821. If I don't hear from you by May 10, I will assume that you are not interested.

All crew will sleep on board--no hotel rooms will be provided. Air fare will not be provided; each person is expected to pay his/her own. For crew use, basic food (similar to long voyage fare) will be on board at all times. Funds are not available for restaurant eating.

Crew selection will be based upon:

- 1) having made a long voyage within the South Pacific
- 2) Capable sailors with good sailing skills.
- 3) Able to relate to and teach the students
- 4) Capability and dependability in cleaning, maintaining and provide security for the canoe.

I will be responsible for selecting crew members.

On each leg there will be a core of 6 to 9 crew who will be modestly compensated. These individuals need to meet the above 4 criteria to be monetarily compensated. Other persons can sail but will not be compensated. Ideally the legs will be manned this way. It is the attempt to pay as many crew as possible, but we are dealing with limited funds and the amount that each crew member will make will depend on the amount of crew who want to sail.

- 1) HNL to HILO - Preference to Oahu crew members
- 2) HILO to MAUI via Kona - Preference to Hawaii island crew members
- 3) MAUI to MOLO to LANAI to Oahu- Preference to Maui, Lanai, Molokai crew members
- 4) OAHU to NIIHAU to KAUAI to OAHU - Preference to Oahu and Kauai crew members.

The reason for preference for crew members from certain islands is to simplify the logistics and cut down inter-island travel.

I have made a tentative crew list and I have enclosed proposed sailing Dates for each crew member. Please let me know if you will be able to make these dates. If you wish to sail on any other leg, please indicate which ones they are. At this point no promises and you will not be monetarily compensated.

Final sail plan and crew selection will be determined after I have received the responses.

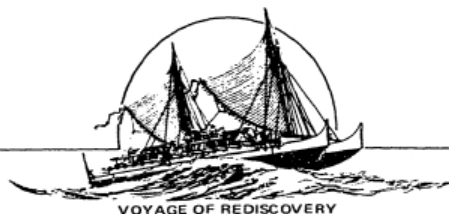



Thank you for inviting me to attend the annual meeting of the Polynesian Voyaging Society on December 8th. As we discussed on the phone, I'm not sure that I can attend but here is some information about Hokule'a's part in our Summer Programs that you might want to share with your members:

--Kamehameha Schools/Bishop Estate hired the Polynesian Voyaging Society to provide a "hands-on" field trip experience aboard the Hokule'a for our students at 14 different DOE-KS/BE Summer Schools. Approximately 4,000 students on six islands were touched by the Hokule'a experience.

--Under the terms of the contract, on each of the school visits, there was a minimum 6-man crew to cover various topics with the students.

--A 100+ page packet of curriculum materials for a unit on Polynesian voyaging was compiled by Cecilia Lindo and Mahela Rosehill and shared at special teacher workshops sponsored by KS/BE. These workshops gave teachers a better idea of how to use the unit with students who ranged in grades from K-8.

--Nainoa Thompson was in charge securing the ports, setting up the field trips and hiring the crew. He also invited former crew members who lived on the respective islands to participate in the field trip while the canoe was in their home port. In general, there was a good response from former crew. Some of them even gave talks about their experiences at schools on their island.

--Other key members of this successful experience were Chad Baybayon and Aaron Young. They were the more "permanent" members of the crew who made adjustments daily to improve the curriculum as they went along. (These young men, along with Nainoa and Snake Ah Nee also met with me after the programs ended to evaluate the experience and get some idea of how we might work together again for next year.)

--During the field trips, students had an opportunity to board the Hokule'a, view a slide show that covered preparation for the sail, and listen to a dockside lecture about ancient Polynesian migration.

Serving Hawaii's Children for 100 Years

--After their visit, the students and teachers went back to their classroom and produced some very nice thank you letters and evaluations which we have shared with the crew. (I've also enclosed some other evaluations which I would appreciate having back later for my presentation to the trustees.)

--In addition to scheduled visits by our students in the morning, many other individuals and groups from the community visited the canoe in the afternoon or evening. On Lana'i, for example, the crew conducted a special star watch session for the community at night.

--All of the communities visited by the Hokule'a were anxious to extend their hospitality in some way, however, due to time constraints, this was not always possible.

--The print media on the different islands also reported on the Hokule'a's visits (see enclosed clippings). I believe there was also some coverage on KGMB television as well as on KITV. On radio, Cecilia Lindo, Mike Tongg and I also did a one-hour talk show for "Cousin Awana's Fish Bowl" about Hokule'a Summer sail.

--KS/BE's newsmagazine, He Aha Ka Meahou Ma Kamehameha, also did a feature story on Hokule'a's participation in our Summer Programs. We've set aside 100 copies for you to distribute at the meeting.

--Also, at her request we provided Barbara Lee of the Natural Energy Lab of Hawaii with some photos and captions about Hokule'a's involvement with KS/BE Summer Programs, which she shared at the National Marine Educators Association Conference in Monterey this past July.

As you can see, it's been quite a successful joint venture. At this time, I'm not sure whether we will be asking to work with Hokule'a again or what the scope may be. Personally speaking, I think it would be a good thing but a lot depends on PVS's own plans, the crew, people who are working on the curriculum, and the Trustees. 
